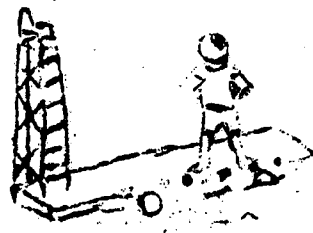
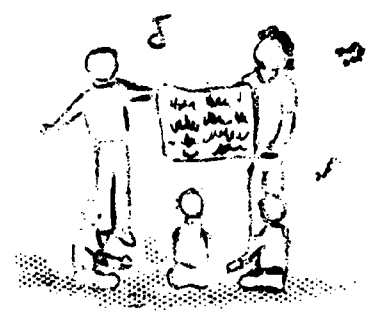

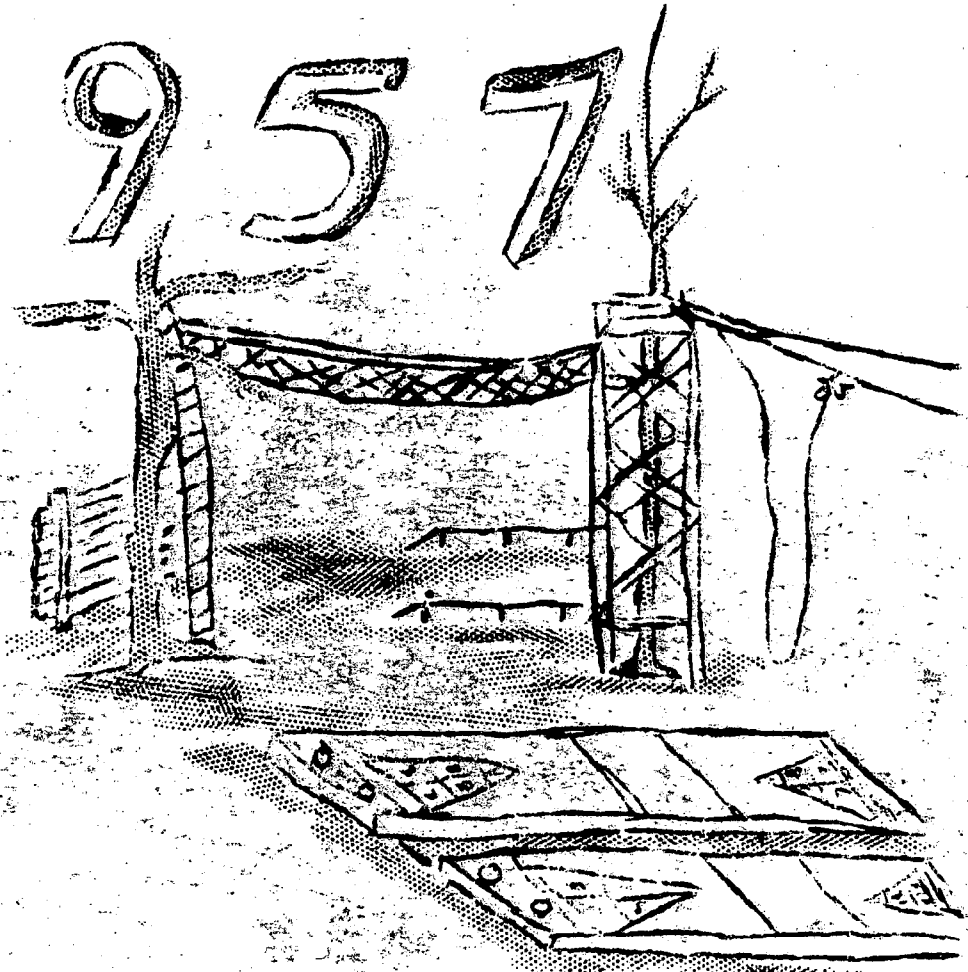

DIVREI HASHALLACH GERSHON

With the closing of Camp Kadimah, I have since leaving Israel, completed a year's work for Canadian Young Judeaea. By the end of last summer I was able to visit Camp Hagshama, Camp Biliun and Camp Shalom. During the winter months, I worked in Montreal, both at Head Office and for the centre itself. I was able to make field trips to the Maritime region where I visited all centres, even the remote ones. In this trip, I encountered the problems of the movement first hand, and I'm happy to say that I became good friends with many of the leaders of the region. Finally, at one of the meetings of the Hakhaga Eliona of Young Judeaea, it was decided that I, as Shallach, should fulfill the position of Program Director at Camp Kadimah.

Now that I've given a general picture of my position in the movement and my link with camp, I would like to say a few words about the program at Kadimah itself, to indicate whether we accomplished our goals or not.

Camp Kadimah is a camp belonging to the Zionist Organization of Canada and as such it has a specific purpose, namely to make the Jewish youth aware of the problems of its people and inspire them with the love of Zion. Together with this, it must develop that spirit of scouting and of sportsmanship which is expressed in the slogan "a healthy body and a healthy mind".

The summer camps of Young Judeaea are just a portion of the year's work in the movement, and what is accomplished in camp, the spirit of comradeship, the unity, must continue throughout the year in Young Judeaea. We all leave camp with a good feeling, we had a good time, we enjoyed ourselves, and we learned

something. But did we really accomplish our purpose? That only time will tell. Now it is my intention to sum up the results in the various areas of programme to point out what materials we worked with and what we achieved.

First of all we had close to twenty-two sicut. On one hand we discussed topics on the period of Moses and the Exodus from Egypt. On the other hand we discussed such matters as the flight of the Pilgrim Fathers and were able to draw interesting comparisons. Furthermore, we compared the revolt of the Maccabees with the revolt in the Warsaw ghetto. Similar subjects were covered in the light of Zionist concept of pride in our nation and religion. Topics were adapted to the various age groups and great interest was shown in such matters as the Dead Sea Scrolls and the rise of Christianity. Herzl and Bialik, both important figures in the life of our people, gave us central topics around which work was done in drama, arts and crafts, song and dance, which resulted in presentations which will remain a long time in our memories. The history of Zionism, the War of Independence, were also used as topics for our sicut.

In the field of arts and crafts many of the campers had the opportunity to display their talents in many new projects. The amulets and ceramic work are clear evidence of the pleasant and useful hours spent in the arts and crafts building. Under the talented direction of Honey.

The memories of Israeli songs and dances, which were taking place on the pavilion in the day and under the lights will give us happy hours for a long time to come. On the average, the campers learned from twelve to fifteen new dances and the advanced group managed close to thirty. Chavers Lily, for whom no effort or obligation was too much, and who worked day and night can look back upon this period in terms of the saying "we reaped in tears and

sowed in joy."

In the field of scouting and pioneering the chaverim will, without doubt, not forget the magic word "omega". Overnights hikes, competition in Maccabia, the building of camps, a Burma bridge, and rope ladders up trees to points across the lake, gave competition to the hearty and excellent nerve tests to the daring. I hope that all these constructions will leave an indelible impression on your minds.

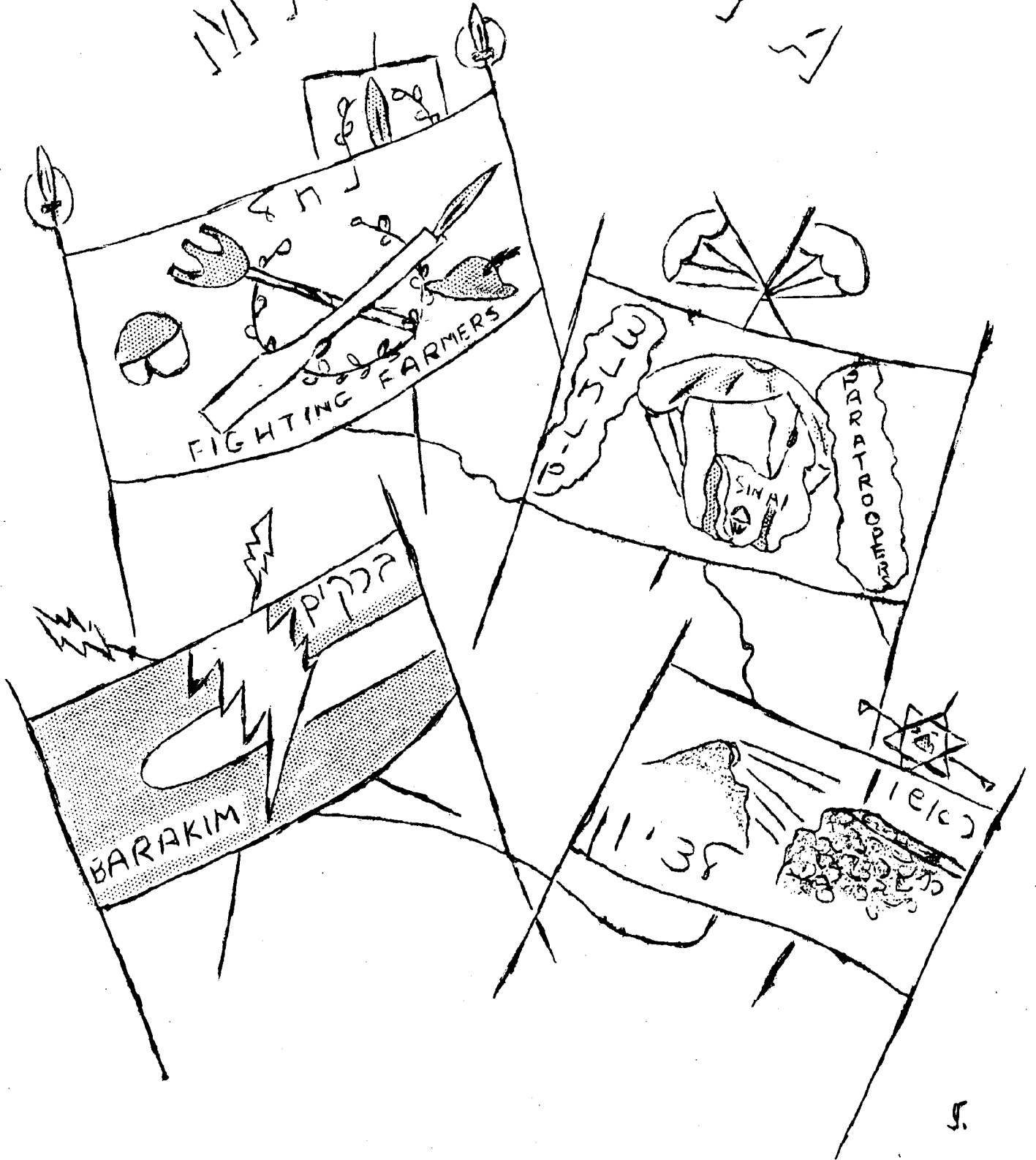

MACCABIA 1957-

Maccabia originated in Israel, and is similar to the Olympic Games. It has brought the same spirit and sportsmanship to Kadimah as has been displayed in our homeland.

Maccabia, 1957, began on Sunday, July 28. The parents had left their weary children to another two weeks at the wilds of Camp Kadimah. At the evening meal, the dining hall broke into Lochmai Hanegev's song, "Maccabia's Here" and after this, Ellis Ross announced the Maccabia teams.

Immediately, teams hustled into preparation. By counselors' curfew, songs, names, dramatic presentations, and banners had been created. Thus began the six most strenuous days Camp Kadimah has ever seen.

Through Monday and Tuesday teams were busy marching, singing, dancing, and acting. Finally the moment arrived.

Tuesday evening, the opening march past was held. Colourful teams waving colourful flags and banners and singing their marching songs, proceeded from the girls' side to the boys' sports field. There the teams were met by Greek gods from Mount Olympus. Shep Kaplow, Gershon Yuval, and Hank Kuryluk rode into the sports field on a wagon, led by Mr. Eisner's horse. After the impressive lighting of the Maccabia fire by four bronzed figures, the Maccabia pledge was recited. Each team then sang one song and two cheers and broke off for team games.

On Wednesday, Boker Tov was announced and immediately hustling and bustling people were seen racing in and out of cabins, preparing for march past. Mifoad was held, and the blue and white teams went through a vigorous period. Following a hearty breakfast, an extremely

well-run track meet was run off. The final event, the marathon, was completed and the weary campers and counselors plodded off to the dining hall for a much needed and much enjoyed meal.

After a restful rest period, the teams went at it again, tooth and nail, this time in regatta. Boat races and war canoes highlighted the programme. Supper, followed by the march past, and team games, completed the day's schedule. One of the best basketball games seen in a long time at Kadimah was played Wednesday night as Red beat white 20-19 in a game in which the winning basket wasn't scored until only about thirty seconds remained. Thus ended the first hectic day of the 1957 Maccabia.

On Thursday morning the campers awoke to the sound of Barakim. Rain pummeled the roofs of the cabins and lightning was seen flashing through the sky. The morning was spent on preparations for song and dance and dramatics. The afternoon was turned into a free afternoon with no concentration of Maccabia at all. After supper two basketball games were played and another day of Maccabia closed. However, this one was a welcome sight to campers and counselors.

On Friday, however, things got moving with the swim meet. This, too, was run very efficiently. After dinner and rest period the swim events were finished and rehearsals were held for song and dance and drama. Just before supper, the final field event, the high jump, was completed. Immediately after this, a softball game was held between the white and Blue. At night the dramatic presentations were held in the Rec Hall and were enjoyed by all.

Saturday morning after breakfast and cleanup, the song and dance demonstrations were presented; and then came the highlight of the Maccabia -- the Tug of War. The Blue team was victorious. In the afternoon the final event was held. Scouting was held on the girls'

side of the bridge, and none of the judges choked on the coffee made by the four teams.

The extras were held right after the scouting and carried on through supper.

At supper, Maccabia spirit hit its peak, and each team presented two songs and two cheers. The dining hall soon emptied and the campers and counselors joined together for a hora in the middle of the boys' sport field. However, the people, dancing madly, were called together for the final march past. At the closing fire, each co-captain hurled her team's flag into the fire which was doused by the captains.

The scores were then announced, and the yellow team, the winners, led the parade into the Rec Hall where the trial of the judges was held. After much dunking in the lake the judges had received their punishment, and weary campers and counselors went to bed, extremely happy over this Maccabia, the best Maccabia Kadimah has ever seen.
