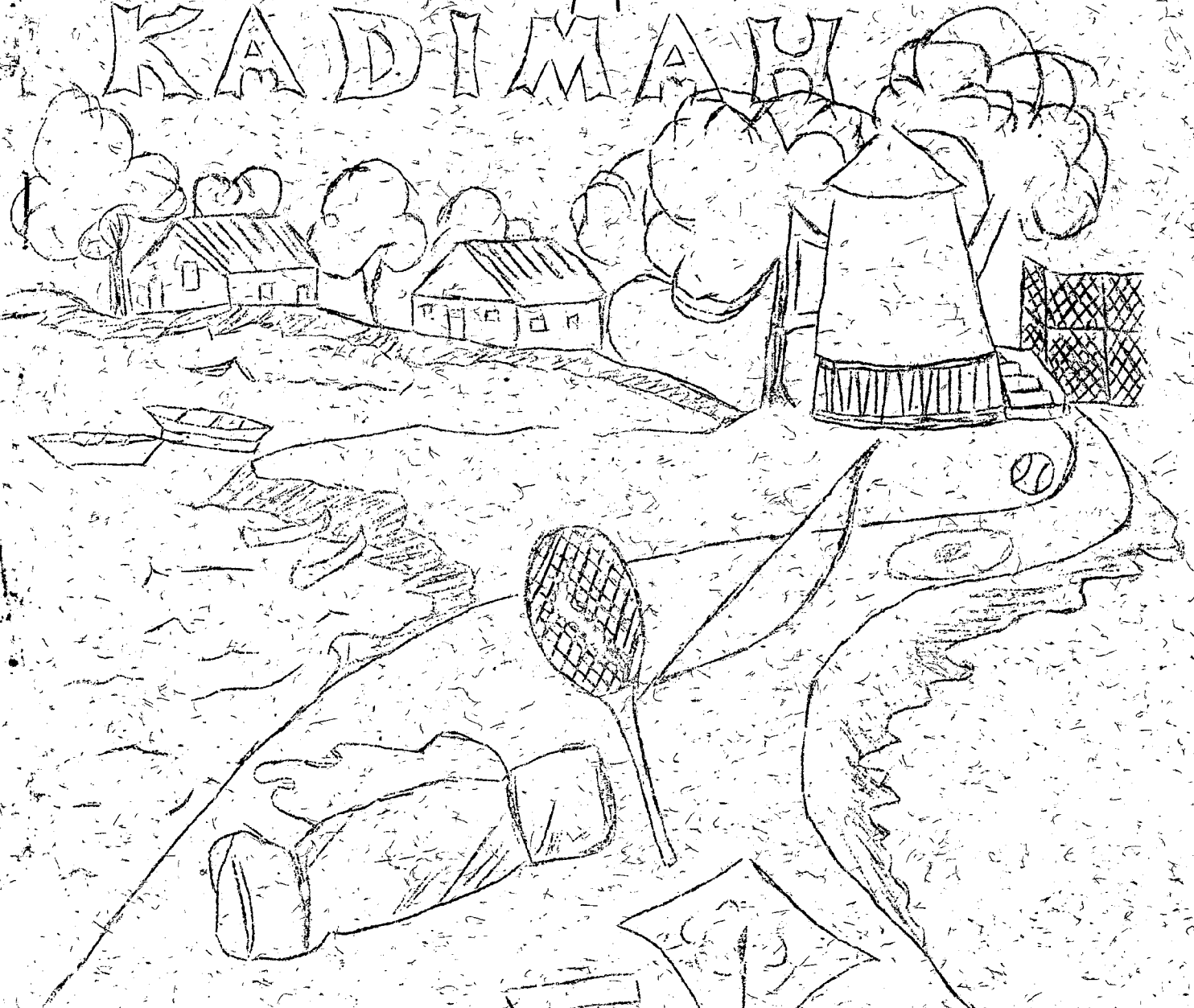


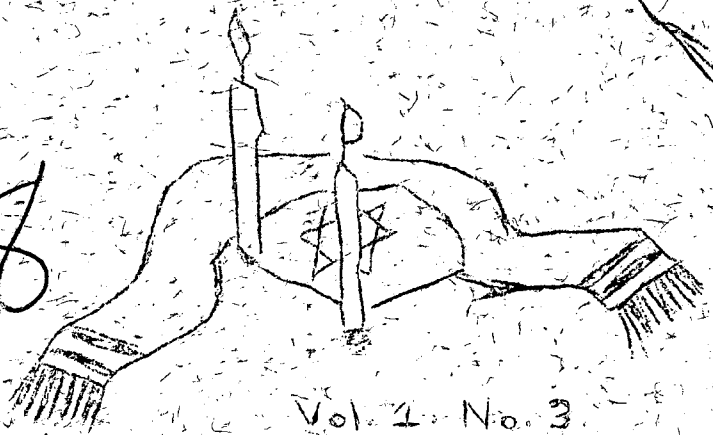

## THE SEASON IN RETROSPECT

As the summer draws to an end, I find myself formulating some sound conclusion as to the degree of success of the camp season. To say that the season was successful is not enough. To a few people this may mean anything short of a bad season, thus the proper evaluation becomes a difficult matter.

At present I would like to discuss program emphases or objectives, and to judge whether the program has achieved the purpose for all campers. A rough indication of the probable success of camp can often be formulated before the season opens because the calibre of the staff is generally directly related to the success of the season. In this respect I feel that the staff was very capable and approached their jobs with vigor and sincerity. However, an intensive pre-camp training program was necessary to channel this energy so that our camping objectives could be realized without misunderstanding and confusion.

With the staff geared towards a set of high standards we launched on our voyage. Because nature was good to us with plenty of warmth and sunshine, the sailing was even more pleasant and our program more enthusiastically accepted. With this beautiful outdoor setting to our benefit we cultivated an emotional at-homeness with nature. Through our educational program which encompassed Sitchot, Arts & Crafts, Song & Dance & Dramatics, we established a strong link with the rich heritage of Israel. Our bodies sang to the pleasures of ground sports and waterfront activities. All of these programming events gave us a treasure of happy experiences.

With this feeling of satisfaction our spirit kept rising to high levels. I must say that now and again the spirit seemed to lag but high-lights in our programme such as Maccabia, Hityashvut and Dramatic Festival boosted the spirit to higher levels. The natural setting itself, the informal association with campers and staff, the zest, spontaneity, and the fact that the total individual lives his total life, for the time being, in the camp community. The advantage educationally, of the whole person living and acting vigorously in a relatively unified environment is tremendous --- all of these factors entered in the generation of a wonderful "camp spirit".



As I have enriched my own insight and skills, I have the deep satisfaction of knowing that in doing so I have helped many campers and staff members to have a more rewarding experience.

Finally I want to say that being here as Camp Director has been a privilege and deep honor which will never be forgotten and the great affection I have for the campers and staff will never diminish.

#### THE PRESS MUST GO THROUGH

On Saturday evening, August 16, at approximately 12:30 A.M., the paper was in the last stages of production. At this time after many hours of pains-taking labour, an incident arose which could have very well spelled destruction for our publication. The Gestetner machine after many hours of loyal continuous service developed internal injuries and was unable to be use further. At this point the servicemen Barry Jacobson and Benji were called in to investigate these internal difficulties. After many hours of delicate manipulating its found that it was impossible to repair the machine at camp due lack of parts.

At this point we set out to find if there were any other machine of this type in the sourding country side. The camp intelligence officer Berry Jaconsonson immediately radioed for assistance from the New Germany telephone operator, from this contact we got in touch with the Royal Canadian Mountain Police at 1.30 in the morning. There office in bridge water reffered us to the local press. Although they did not have a machine , reffered us to Mr. Ralph Faulkner representative of the local high school. The intelligent service thought of phoning the Head Office in Halifax to inform them of our situation. The Head-Office came forth with the suggestion to relay a new machine to camp. At this point we are still awaiting the arriving of the new machine from Halifax. If this page appears in the paper it will serve as evidence of the slogan " IF YOU WILL IT, IT IS NO DREAM ".

A MESSAGE FROM THE PROGRAM DIR.

For more than ten years I have been affiliated with youth and adult activities, Zionist movements, student organizations, etc... Being a President of the Babylon Foundation, whose main aim is to observe and assist the new adult and youth immigrants from unadvanced countries or neighbouring states and to adjust them to Israeli society, I am able to stress and summarize the judgement which I have made about the Campers, Counsellors, the Head Staff, as well as the programme of Camp Kadimah, 1958.

I came to Canada for two major reasons: the first to study and understand the Zionist organizations in North America, in general, and in Canada, particularly. The second reason is only an accessory to the first, to continue my studies and to have close contact with the Jewish students in this part of the continent.

In analysing the programme of our camp, it is logical to analyse the theme of the camp. Camp Kadimah is a physical, intellectual, and spiritual centre of the Maritime region of Young Judaea. Because of this, Kadimah has more responsibilities than an ordinary Summer Camp. Its major aim is to prepare the campers, the leaders of tomorrow, in the Zionist field, as well as in the rest of the camp activities, mainly Song and Dance, Arts and Crafts, programming, so that those leaders can continue to carry on the mission of Zion in their own centres.

It is true that this season we accomplished much in all our activities and I would like to point it out as follows:

In sichot we had about 24 sichot, beside some discussions which took place spontaneously with current world affairs. The major part of the sichot discussed the great personalities in Jewish history, namely: Moses Hess, Achad Ha'am, Herzl, Bialik, Weizman, Henrietta Szold; the aims and ways of the Young Judaea Movement (which, unfortunately almost none of the campers knew about); some topics about the Galut; anti semitism, the aliyoth; the defense movement in Palestine and problems of Israel.

There is no doubt about the fact that much has been put into the Waterfront this year. Chaver Isaac Boniuk, a qualified swimming instructor, ran the water sports with the help of qualified assistants and some counsellors. With the nice weather we had this season, we accomplished the following:

In the field of land sports, although there were no professional instructors to lead us in the activities, the programme was carried out satisfactorily.

Since one of the themes of the programme was the tenth Anniversary of Israel, and because song and is part of the celebration, therefore we tried to emphasize Israeli songs and dances. Beyond any doubt, the Song and Dance instructress, Lilly Rivlin, exercised her utmost effort to teach more songs of Zion and dances of Israel. This year, on the average, the campers learned from I3-I4 dances and from I6-I7 songs, as shown in the following statistics: Jrs.-Dances-I8--Lower Int.-Dances-II  
Songs--24-- Songs--I2  
Upper Int.-Dances-I5--Seniors-Dances-I3-- LIT-Dances--II  
Songs--I5 Songs--I7 Songs---I4

There is no need to mention the hard and sincere effort that Lilly Rivlin put in this field to make our season a success.

Arts and Crafts added the art of Mosaics to its programme this year and many of our campers have a nice souvenir from the Arts and Crafts Building as evidence of pleasant and useful hours that they spent in this place, under the direction of Miss Honey Fox.

Scouting this year took a new feature - that of practical scouting, which concentrated more on hiking than the theory of camping. The groups had cook-outs in order to be able to manage themselves in the main Hityashvut. Besides the Hityashvut we had, as well, two canoe hikes. Thanks must be stressed here to those who led the groups in their Hityashvut, and to those who instructed the campers in the art of scouting.

The dramatics program this season has, as well as teaching something about drama, emphasized a major event, the celebration of the Tenth Anniversary of Israel. There is no better document to express the importance of drama groups as well as the success of these drama groups, than "The Morning Express", which appeared in camp the day following the Drama Festival.

If I want to mention anything about hobbies, then I must congratulate the leaders and especially newspaper and broadcasting leaders - Charles Flam, Joel Jacobson, and Susan Isaacs, for their sincere efforts and their day and night work to recharge our soul with news of our small society and to give us a document of our camp.



## The Middle East Crisis and Israel

Reprinted from an article in The Judaean by Irving Isenberg of Camp Biluim:

For the last ten years, Russia, the United States, the Arabs, Israel, and oil have been making the headlines of our newspapers. Russia has for a long time wanted a sphere of influence in the Middle East and an ocean port on the Mediterranean. The communist regime of Russia supports as their puppet in the Middle East our evil genius--Nasser.

When Great Britain evacuated Palestine (1948) which was under the U.N.'s mandate, it left the country in chaos. The country was divided between the Jewish State of Israel and the Arab State. The separate Arab countries vowing to destroy Israel, attacked, but were repulsed and were forced to retreat. They left with a burning hate for Israel.

Egypt, the strongest Arab nation, was in reality the leader of the Arab world. Because of the decadence of the Egyptian monarchy under King Farouk and the greed for power of a clique of officers, a revolution took place in 1952, with General Naguib as leader. Nasser soon forced Naguib out of the picture and since then, he has appeared as the leader of a movement for unity of the Arab countries. Nasser has done little for Egypt, but much for himself. In the mind of the Arabs, he is a hero and he has encouraged this by organizing raids on Israel by means of Arab refugees whom he has indoctrinated. By repeatedly insulting Great Britain, and being instrumental in their evacuation from the Suez he has attracted universal Arab applause. Nasser achieved great influence in Jordan and so interfered in Jordan politics including the almost complete withdrawal of the British from Jordan; militarily and economically.

At this point (1957), Nasser was at one of the peaks of his power and it was rumored that the Jordanian Government was about to fall. Iraq moved her troops to the Jordanian border to help King Hussein, but according to an agreement with Israel, this was considered as a hostile act and the Israeli Army mobilized. The big surprise came when Israel, France, and Great Britain attacked Nasser (Egypt), and would have completely crushed him were it not for the bungling action of John Foster Dulles, who gave the word for the French attack was that Nasser was fomenting revolt among Algerians and arming them. The British were to recapture the Suez Canal, so important in the transport of oil and thus strengthen western defence.

Nasser was now at his lowest ebb, but he soon recovered and soon formed the United Arab Republic. Syria, Egypt, and Yemen are members of it and it is pro-Russia. Hussein of Jordan and Faisal of Iraq, formed the Arab Federation as a pro-western rival, supported by the Eisenhower doctrine.

Now we must review the situation in the Middle East. Russia has as her sphere of influence, Egypt, Syria, and Yemen; while the west has or had the Baghdad Pact, an alliance of Great Britain, Turkey, Iraq, Pakistan, Iran, and Jordan, with the United States' support. This pact was to ward off Communist aggression and ideas.

Then two or three months later, Nasser's supported rebels revolted against the government of Lebanon and made important gains. Saudi Arabia with her oil remained pro-western and very friendly toward the Arab Federation; though she refused to join either.

On the 14th of July, Iraqi officers revolted against their king and killed him, his uncle, along with one of Iraq's greatest statesmen and servant of British policy--Nuri Said. These proclaimed in favour of the United Arab Republic, though they did not join it. Since the main link of the Baghdad Pact defense line was broken militarily, the Shah of Iran and the Turkish government appealed to the United States government for help and the United States' Mediterranean Sixth Fleet landed over ten thousand marines in Lebanon, and is still landing them. The rebel leader has ordered a cease fire of his men, while the United States and Jordan are discussing the reoccupation of Iraq.

At the moment, (July 15), the situation is uncertain and all depends on whether Russia will land troops in Lebanon as the United States did, under the aegis of protecting Russian civilians.

Where does Israel stand? Israel is in a focal point and any danger in the Middle East is Israel's danger and ours. It is more than probable that Israel will stand for the west, but meanwhile every development is important.

### Valedictory (Cont.)

Something new added to the programme this year was the outdoor movie and, of course, we can't forget the successful socials, especially the Masquerade and Sadie Hawkins Dance.

THE LOCUSTS ARE COMING-- Oh how terrifying that cry seemed a few weeks ago. Shocked by the news, we ran throughout camp, following orders precisely for fear of what might happen if we didn't. Then came the climax !! When our nerves were almost at the breaking point we were told to go quickly to the dining hall - where Shep announced that it was a big practical joke. As a result, the Head Staff received a well deserved ducking in Lake William.

Now, let us turn to Hityashvut which, despite the rain, blisters, sore backs, drenched clothing, weary eyes and muscles, was truly a great success.

As far as Maccabia goes, it was terrific being short and much less tiring than other years. I am sure everyone agrees it was the best ever.

So as the years pass - let us always treasure the happy times we have had together this camping season.

A representative was elected from each cabin the following day. Fourteen were elected in all. Executive and council meetings were held frequently.

The campers' council has been a body representing the campers. Any problem which may have arisen in a cabin or group could have been brought before the council.

In pastyears, the campers' council was to have one evening a week for a programme of their choice and under their supervision. This year they have helped with most of the evening activities in various ways. However, they have been responsible for Saturday evening socials as well as certain other programmes. Considerable planning and effort has gone into each one. Aside from an ordinary social, their first programme was a "Sadie Hawkins" affair, in which, during the day, the girls had to chase the boys in order to get a date. The girls called for the boys and had the choice of tags at the dance. It was different from an ordinary social and everyone had fun.

Three days later, on July 22nd., the council worked on a barn dance for which they decorated the Rec Hall very well and prepared a chuckwaggon. After shuffling to the music and calling of two talented gentlemen from Bridgewater, the campers proceeded to the chuckwaggon for their "cactus juice" and beans which set them up for a good nights' rest. It was certainly one of the best barn dances held at Kadimah.

On Thursday, July 24th., campers saw a movie in the fresh outdoors which was arranged by the council.

A permanent decorations committee was set up this year. The members often worked with Honey Fox and helped with such programmes as the Barn Dance, Sadie Hawkins, Fantasy Night, Carnival, Cabaret, and Banquet. Also the council had set up a programme committee to finalize and work on the details of the programmes.

On August 9th., they had a Fantasy Night for which the camp could dress up as any character, in books or movies. First, the programme was highlighted by a mock wedding and later the Grand March during which the best dressed people were chosen to receive prizes. Being a first at Camp Kadimah this evening was enjoyed by all.

On late notice the council members planned and set up the carnival, the proceeds of which went to the Jewish National Fund. Saturday, August 16th., a successful Cabaret night was held during which the counsellors provided the entertainment with their "dramatic presentation" of the "Bridge on the River Willian". Sunday night the highlight of the camp season was held, as the campers and counsellors enjoyed one of the finest banquets ever held at Kadimah.

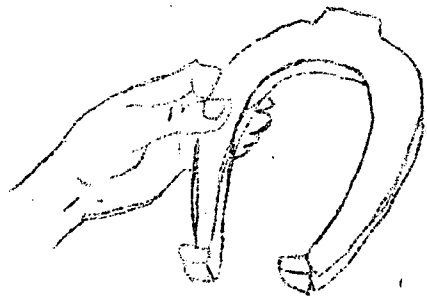
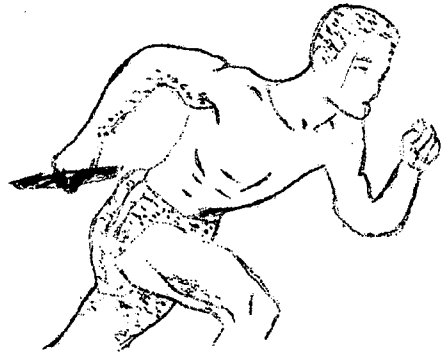
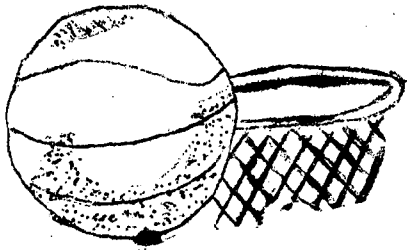
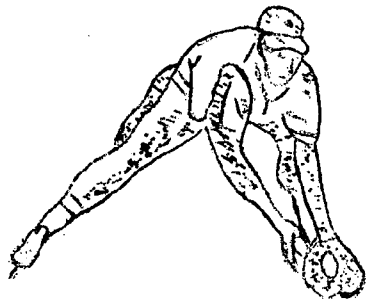


a victory 23 - 21. Then white and Yellow locked horns in the team sports to end Maccabia.
