


SENIOR AND LIT HIKYASHVUT

Several games were played between the counsellors and the campers in the early part of the season. In softball, the boy counsellors defeated the campers and headstaff took a 19 -- 16 win over the counsellors. Sandy Budovitch led the counsellors with 12 points while, Marlene Goldfarb had 10 for the campers.

In a basketball game between the Senior boy counsellors and the Head staff plus campers. the S.C.'S took a 36 -- 25 victory. High scorers were Stan Jacobson and Willie Strug with 9 points. Simcha Ronen led the losers with 9 points.

Kadimah had the pleasure of hosting several visiting teams this year. On July 16, the boys from Halifax made their annual trip led by Joel Jacobson. The Kadimah team edged Halifax 15 -- 12 in softball. Then, the strongest basketball team seen here in years, took the floor against the visitors. The final score was Kadimah 58 and Halifax 21.

Our softball team had its best competition when, New Germany and the Wagner Brothers visited camp. The excellent pitching of Brent and Curly and our loose defense produced a 17 -- 4 victory for New Germany. The good results of this meeting were arrangements to meet the New Germany basketball team.

In the first game between the camp basketball team and the New Germany high team, the final score was 49 -- 43 for camp. High scorer was Willie Strug with 18 points. Kadimah won the return game also, by a score of 43 -- 39. High scorer for Kadimah was Mark Offman with 11.

Following the best Maccabia in years, another Halifax team visited Kadimah. Joel Jacobson, again took the mound, but, this time, with a different team behind him. The result was more decisive. Kadimah won 9 -- 5 although, scoring six runs in the last inning which was called by darkness. In the final basketball game of the

year, Kadimah was the underdog against a highly rated Halifax team. In the first half Kadimah surprised everyone by holding on to a 35 -- 34 lead. The second half showed the real strength of the Kadimah team as the final score was 79 -- 57 for Camp. The outstanding player for Kadimah was Rev Brown with 27 points.

In closing, I am able to say that the spirit this year in sports activity was terrific. Thanks should be given to Simon Gaum, our Chief Umpire and Fred Ross and Jackie Yablon, our Chief Basketball Referees.

An article on the Kadimah Waterfront written to completion would tend to be quite lengthy due to the numerous activities which have taken place. This article will just outline these activities.

The staff this year consisted of: Waterfront Director—Fred Ross; Ass't. Waterfront Dir.—Steve Pink, Laurie Astroff; Danny Newman,

along with the counsellors of each group for whose assistance we are greatly appreciative.

Swim instruction this year was given to each group at the same time every day, with three periods in the morning and one in the afternoon. A free period followed each swim instruction period and the kids could use this time to practice for their tests if they wished.

Unlike other years, 1961 was not a year major Red Cross test passes were plentiful. Instead the year was devoted to non-swimmers leading up to Junior Red Cross Swim Tests. The most remarkable group this year was the Juniors. At the first of the year five campers were in the deep pool of a total of forty. At the end of the Camp season only two remained. The shallow end as a whole held only ten people. The reason for much success can only be attributed to the enthusiasm and the tireless work of the campers along with two aids—, flutter boards and a fruit-juice container. These containers when harnessed to the back of the camper acted as comfortable life-jackets keeping the student buoyant, yet leaving his arms and legs the freedom necessary for learning a stroke. These aids when upon a camper gave him a feeling of safety and self-confidence; thus only five minutes use of this novel device resulted in another successful swimmer entering the deep pool.

Swim instruction also brought in another new activity. This was a Water Safety Leader Course for any Senior Swimmer who wished to take it. Fourteen campers and five counsellors took the course which turned out extremely successful in spite of the frequent interruptions.

Again this year, Life Saving courses were continued. The Bronze Medallion classes by Danny Newman and Frank Medjuck. The Award of Merit Class was led by Steven Pink. A total of twenty people took the courses.

Diving hobby saw a very enthusiastic younger group participate under the direction of Steve Pink. Although we produced no champions, a great deal was learned and enthusiastically received by the parents on our Visiting Day Water Show.


1961 saw two waterfront nights produced. The first was strictly swimming while the second was regatta. Both evenings were enjoyed immensely by both campers and counsellors. The swim night was rather novel—with a light snack at four o'clock P.M.—the activity at five and a light supper at eight thirty in the evening. Participation in both nights activities involved every camper and counsellor at least once and sometimes three times; this was the more reason for its success.

The Kadimah Invitational Swimming Meet was changed this year to Sunday, August 6, instead of on a Saturday, but nevertheless it was extremely successful with seven teams coming to Kadimah. We finished fifth behind Halifax Y.M.C.A. who were the defenders from last year, Banook, Greenwood, and Hantsport. Fine swimming was witnessed and it is expected that an even bigger crowd will be on hand for next year's meet.

Moving to the other sections of the waterfront found an extremely successful boating season under the direction of Norman Ross. Instruction in boating and canoeing was given and then races were organized within the groups, both with oars and with hand paddling. Canoe and boating tests were also looked after, however, not too many fulfilled the requirements of the tests. It is hoped that in the future years the same interest will be shown by the different groups regarding boating.

Added to the waterfront this year were water skis and a new 25 horse-power motor for the boat. In contrast to last year the surfboard was used only a couple of times while the water skis were in constant use by Senior Swimmers and up. All skiers were required to wear life-jackets and two people had to be in the boat at all times when a skier was being towed. Although, the kids found it rather hard at first to get started, once up they were given the thrill of their lives. Perhaps, with the interest shown this year, a more intensified water skiing program will be initiated.

Thus with the above summary, Kadimah waterfront activities draw to a close and as Waterfront Director I must say it was a pleasure to work with everyone in the Camp, especially the campers from whose efforts I received so much satisfaction. Have a good winter — hope to see all of you here again next year.
