

Every one will remember the hikes we took in preparation for Hityashvut and Hityashvut itself which brought all campers together outside the camp. The code word for these hikes was "fun."

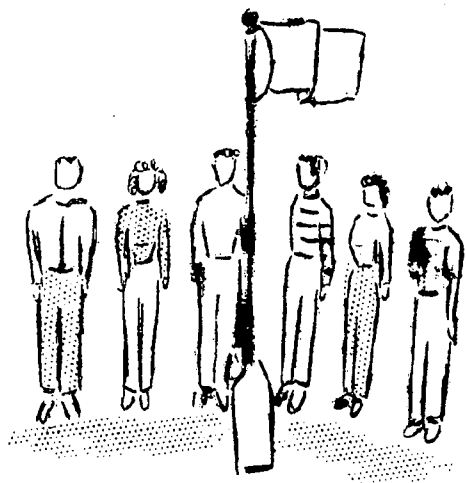

Margot did an excellent job in the Arts and Crafts building as could be seen by all the muddy faces and painted hands around camp. We were all sorry when Margot had to leave camp.

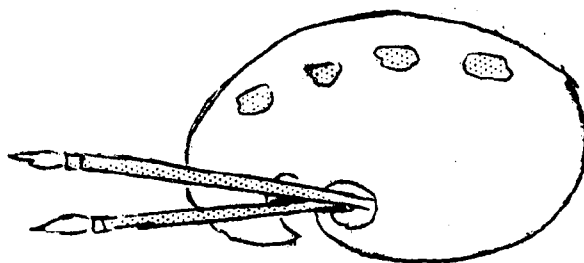

So it can be seen that this year has been a highly successful year. There will be much to talk about in the coming winter

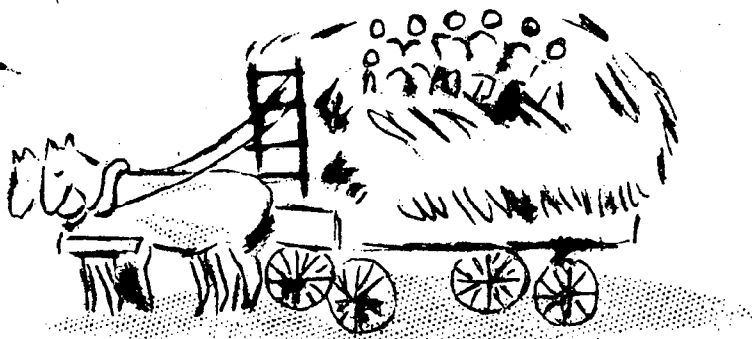
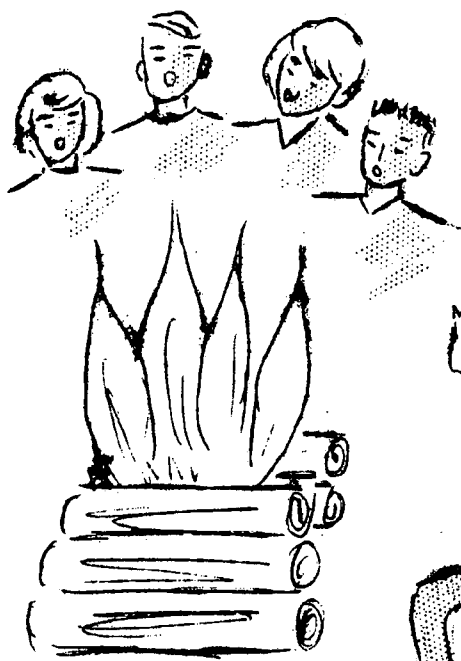

Parents enjoyed the Opening of Maccabia, and at the same time campers participating in the colourful parade felt proud to perform before the eyes of the Visitors.

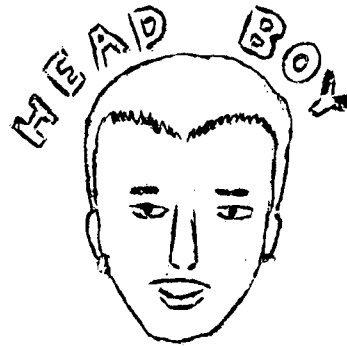

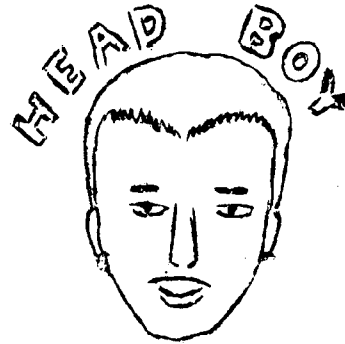

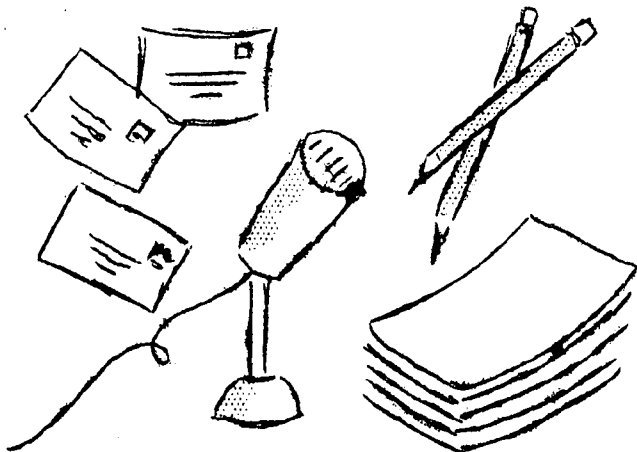

Don't go way, heck no.... we are just getting started. In the meantime Larry has refused to

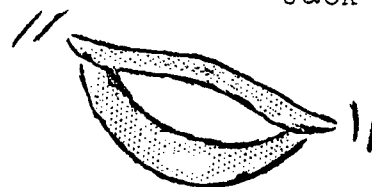

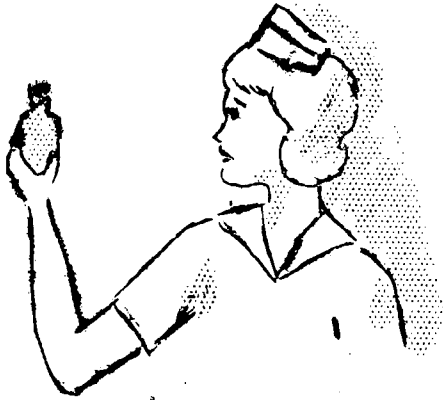

ualties found their way to my door.

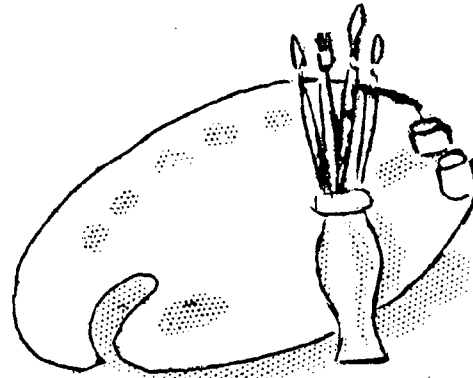

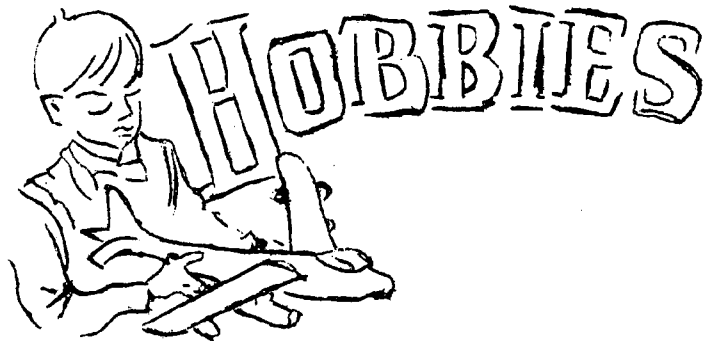

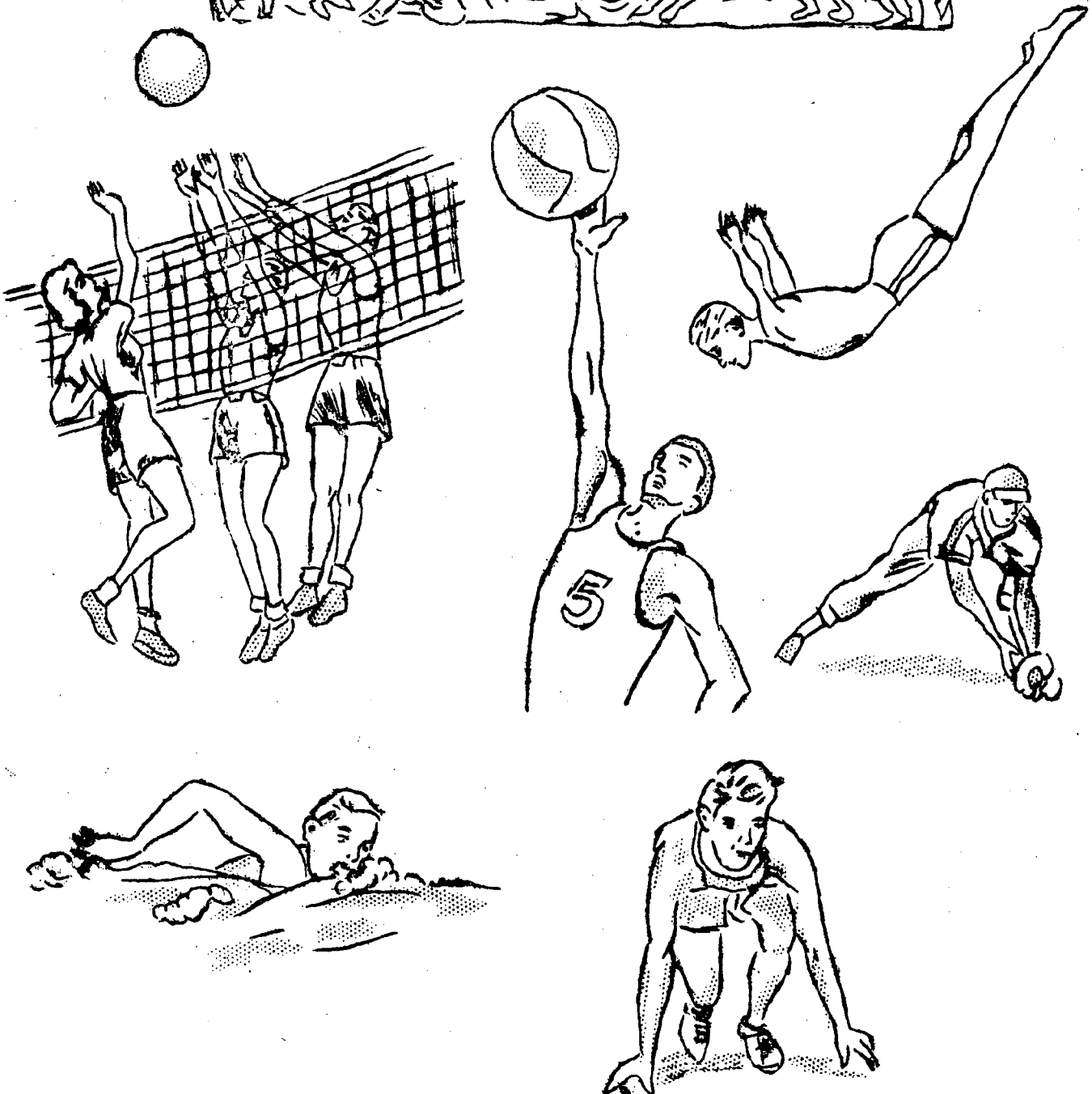
August 14, 1962: Camp finishes pretty soon, so I'll close now. Hope the kids had a good scouting year I did.

To the campers of Camp Kadimah who swam in the Meet---you are to be whole heartedly congratulated for your fine showing in the face of unbeatable odds against placing in too many events. Looking at the fine way you held up the honour of Camp there is nothing else I can say except a sincere "THANK YOU"

To the Camp in general:- It is extremely difficult for a person to enter competition knowing you definitely cannot win or even finish until the race has been over for a couple of seconds. You must realize that most of the visiting clubs all have indoor pools in which they have professional training all year long. They do not specialize in strokes, as we do at Camp, but stay strictly to building their club for the various swimming meets throughout the year. In this light we must try to overcome the negative attitude that I found when speaking to some of you and I just hope that if we have a Swim Meet next year and you are asked to be on the Kadimah Swim Team, that you will consider it an honour to be asked and will not hesitate, for your own well-being, the Camp and for the visitors entering Camp, to come forth with a definite, "Of course I will--in which events will I be swimming?"

To date the pass list for Red cross Tests is not completed, but in the Life-Saving field it is expected that the Bronze Medallion will produce about 12 new Life Guards for Kadimah 1963 ,and about 5 new Award of Merit passes.

Another part of the Waterfront activities centered around the Boat dock area. First with the Water Skis. At the beginning of the Camp season the Master Schedule called for  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour free time before dinner

which was utilized for camper water-skiing and surf boarding only. Counsellors and Life Guards used Saturdays and after General Swims. This was an ideal arrangement in which many people enjoyed this new sport. Unfortunately, the schedule was changed and naturally it affected the amount of time available for maximum use of the skis. It is hoped that next year time will be provided in the schedule for water skiing.

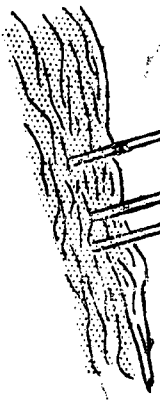
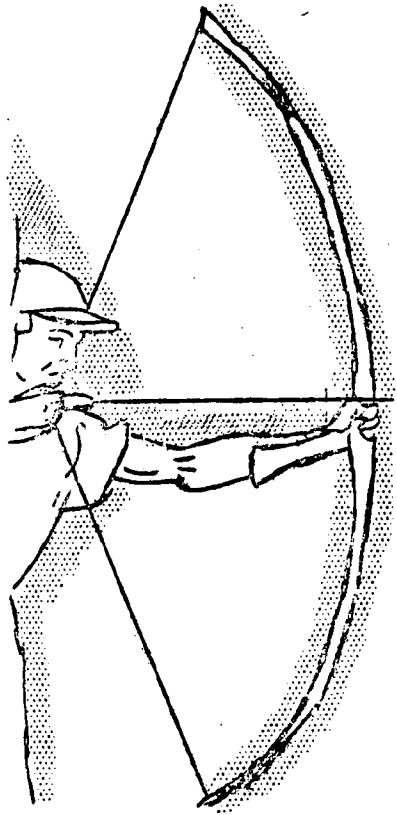

In conclusion I would like to thank my assistant Arnie Budovitch and all those others who helped make the sports schedule run smoothly.

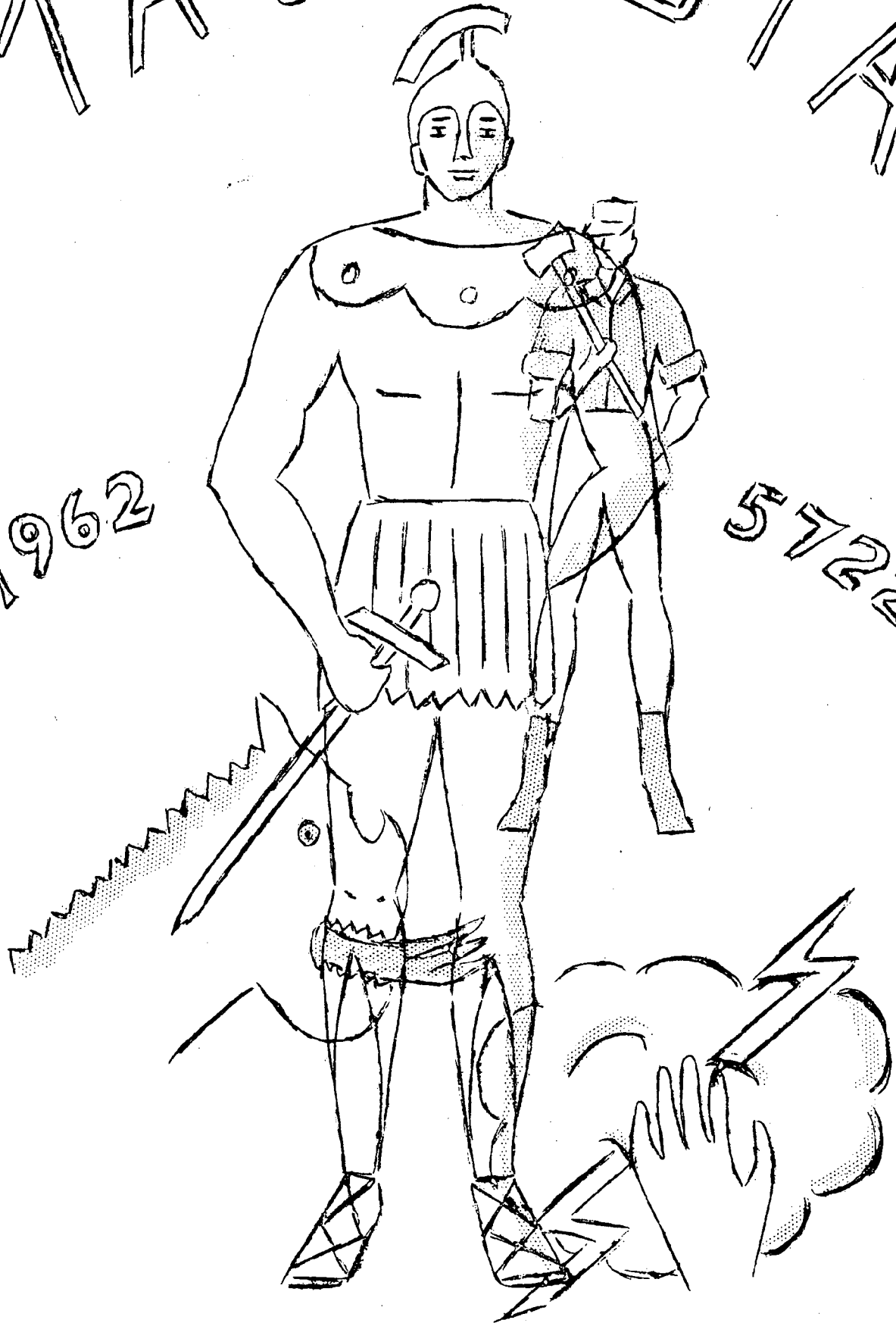
