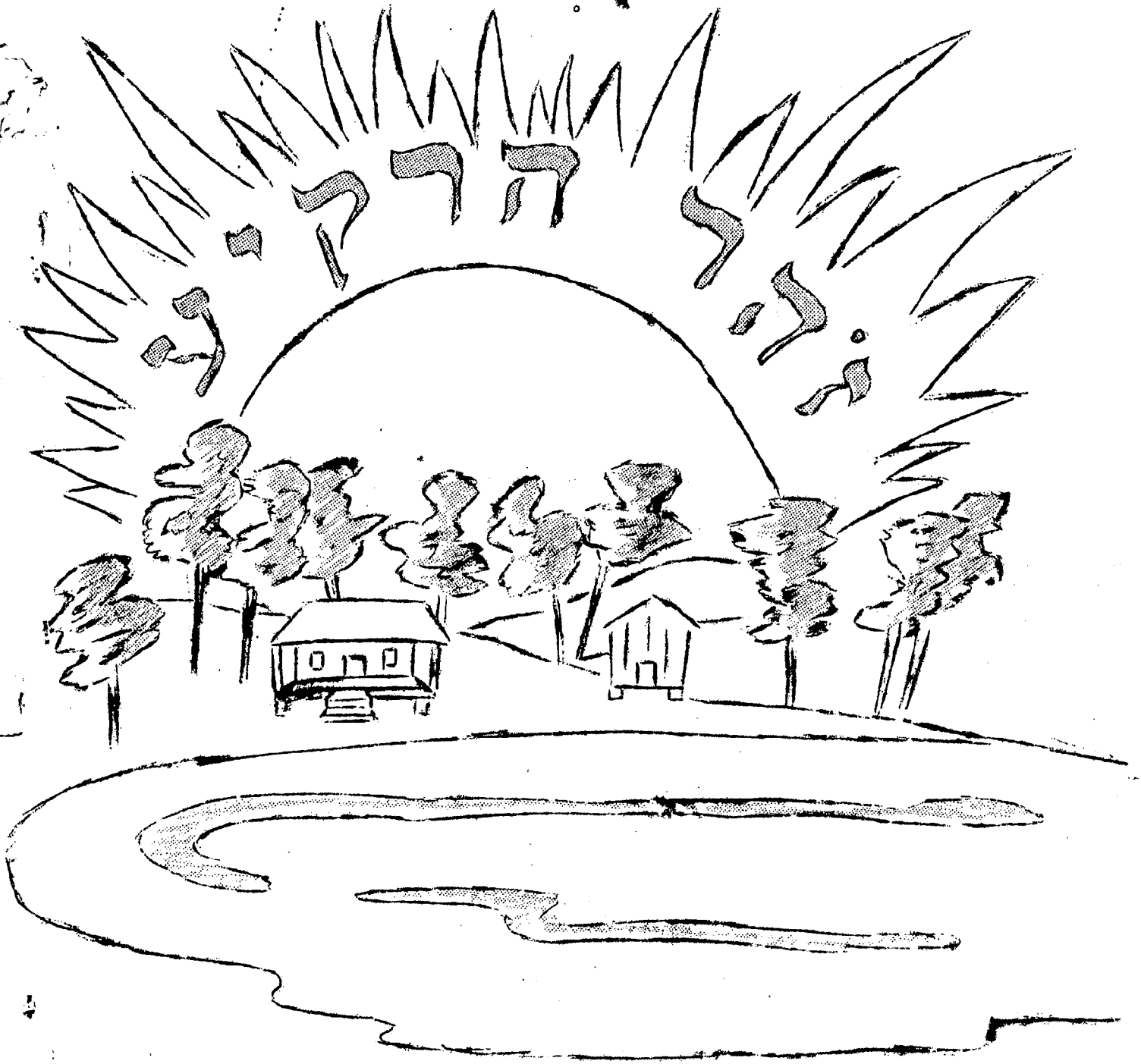

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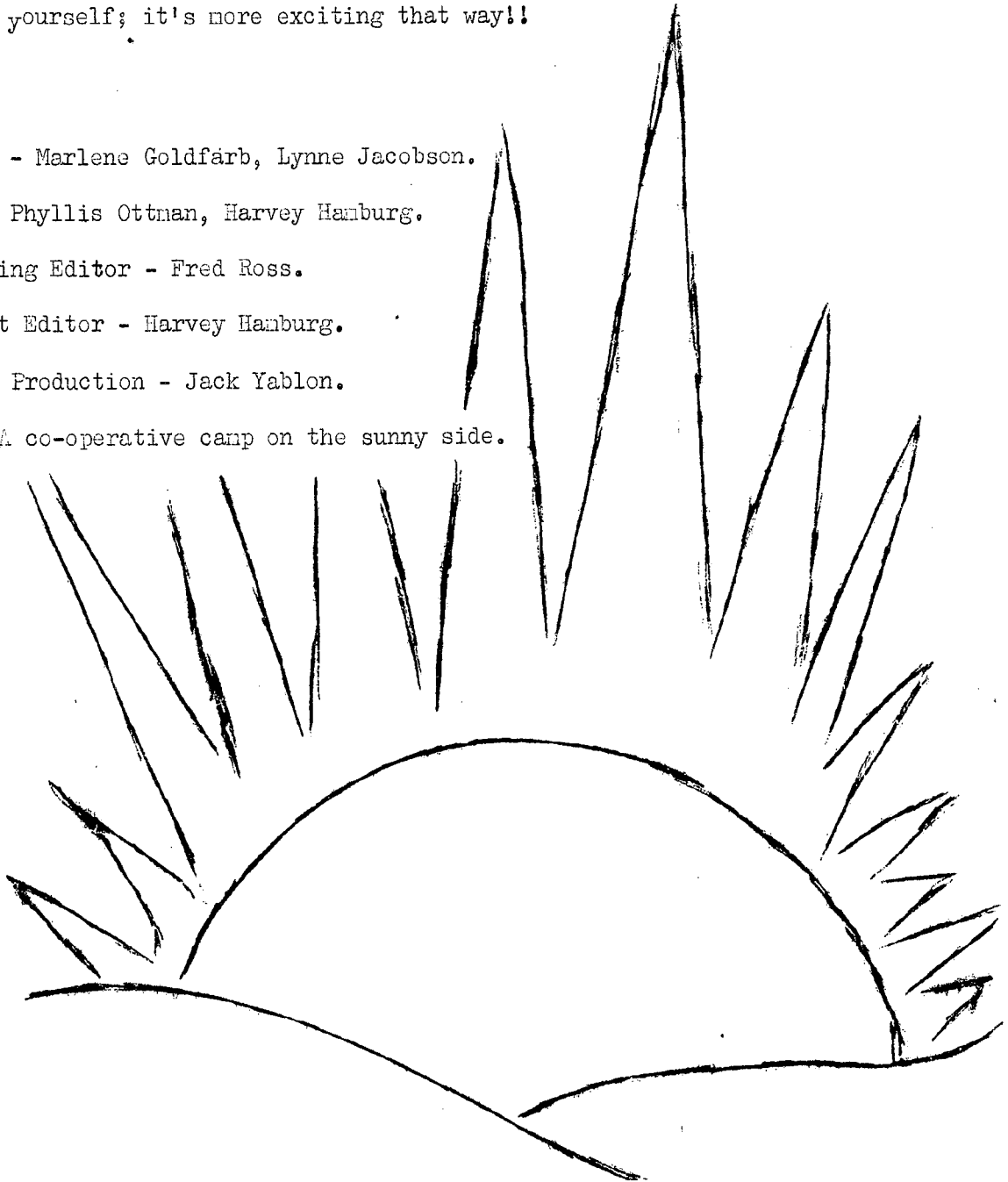

LONG BE REMEMBERED IN OUR HEARTS.

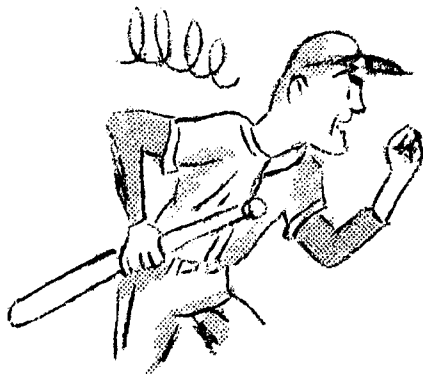
FOR ME PERSONALLY, THIS YEAR IN KADIMAH WAS A GREAT PLEASURE, AFTER BEING HERE

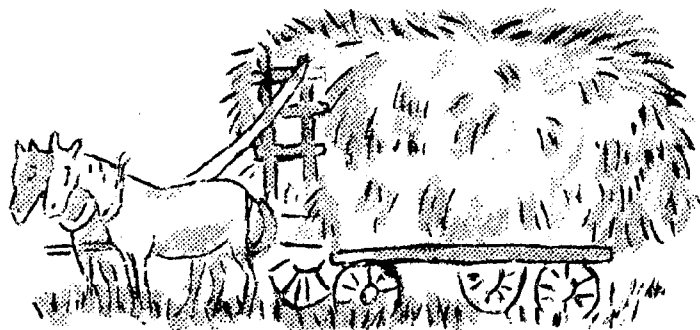
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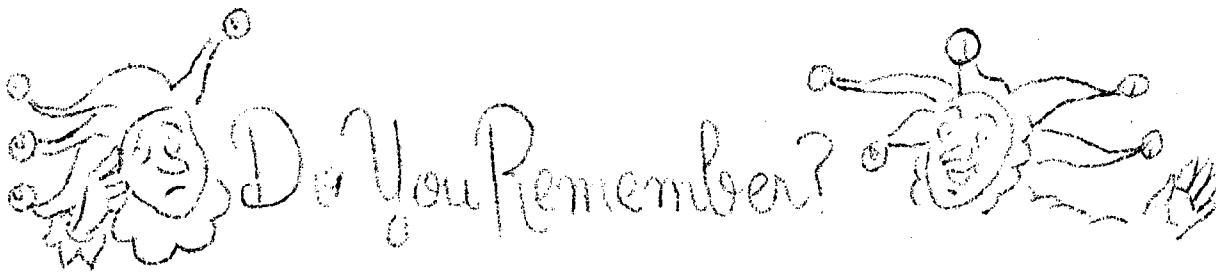

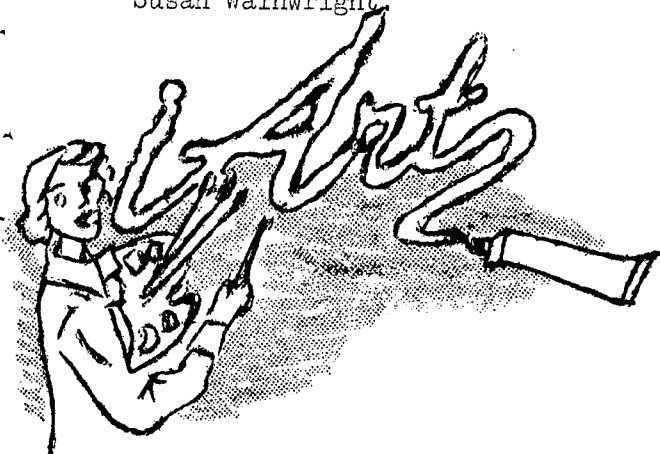
ARTS & CRAFT OFFICE

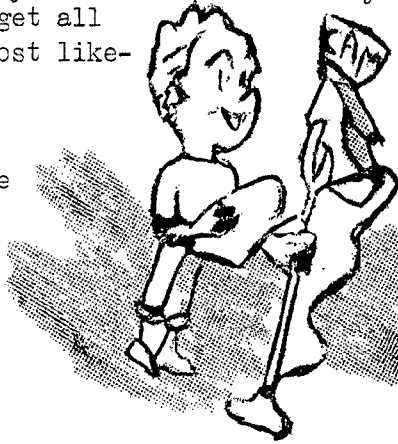

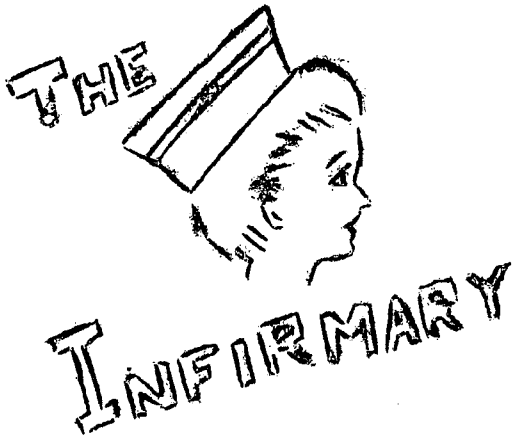

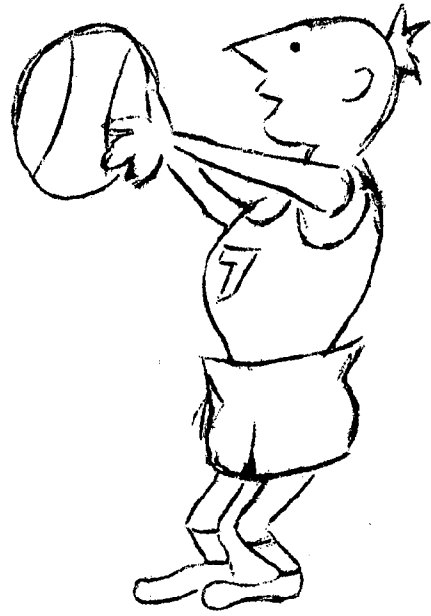

Dovid Melech which have managed to hold their own.

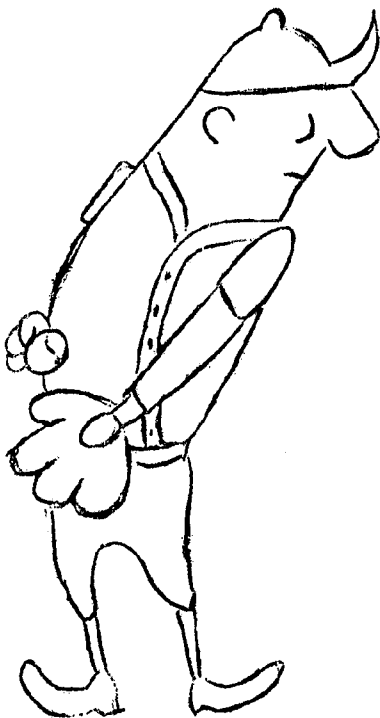
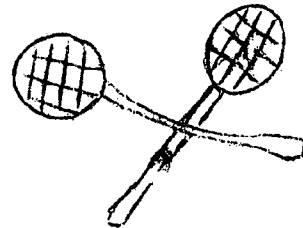

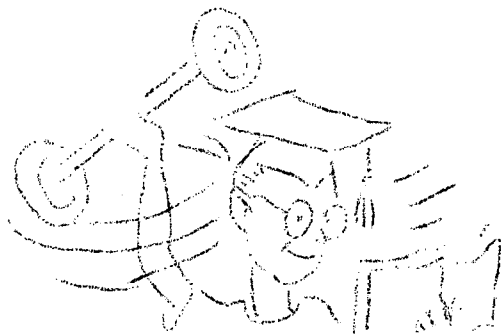


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LAND SPORTS REPORT 1963

The paddle boards were again in action, unfortunately it sprang a leak and had to be put into retirement. Come back next year and both will again be in operation more actively of course.

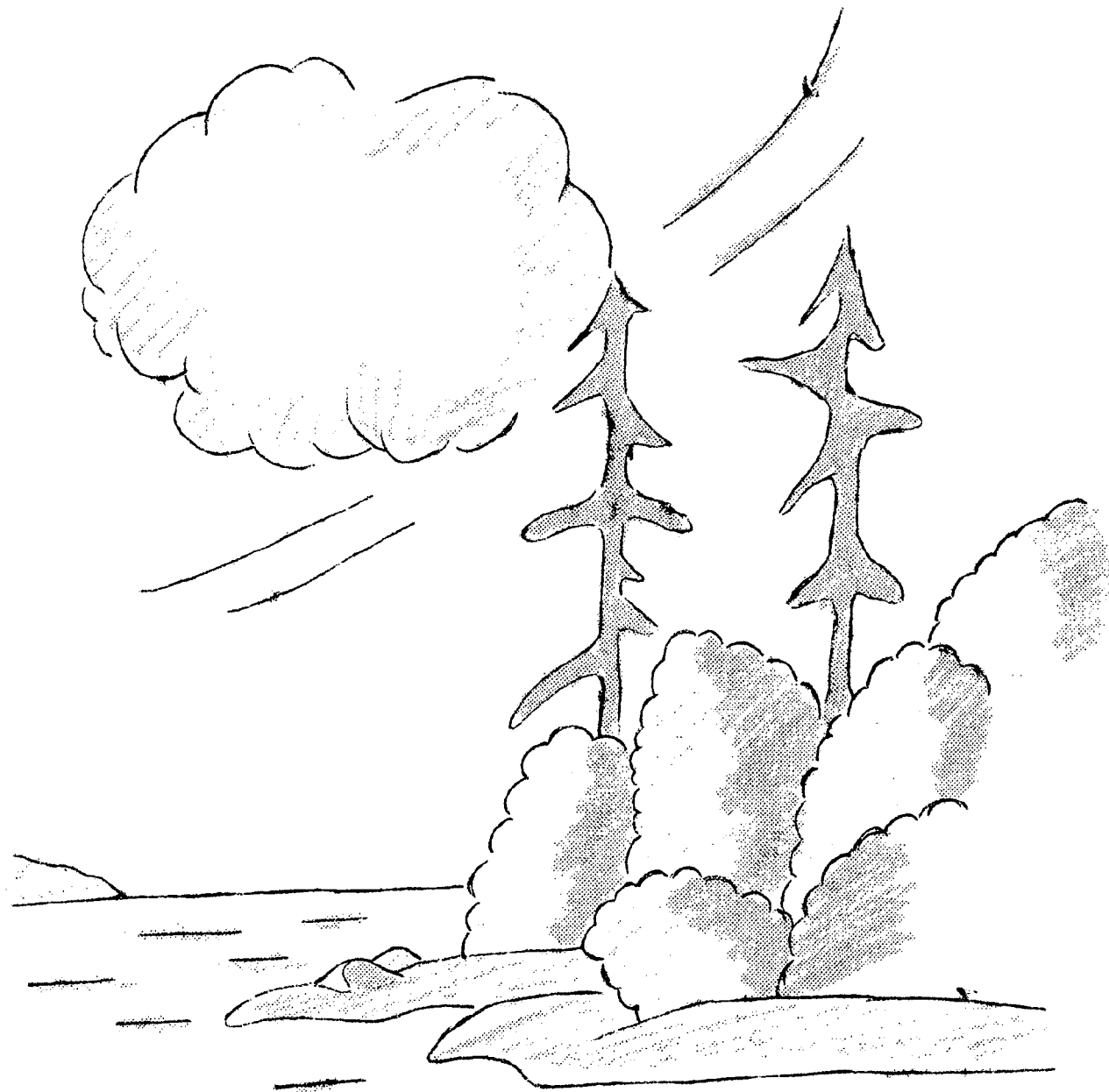

a very rousing sing song followed by curfew.

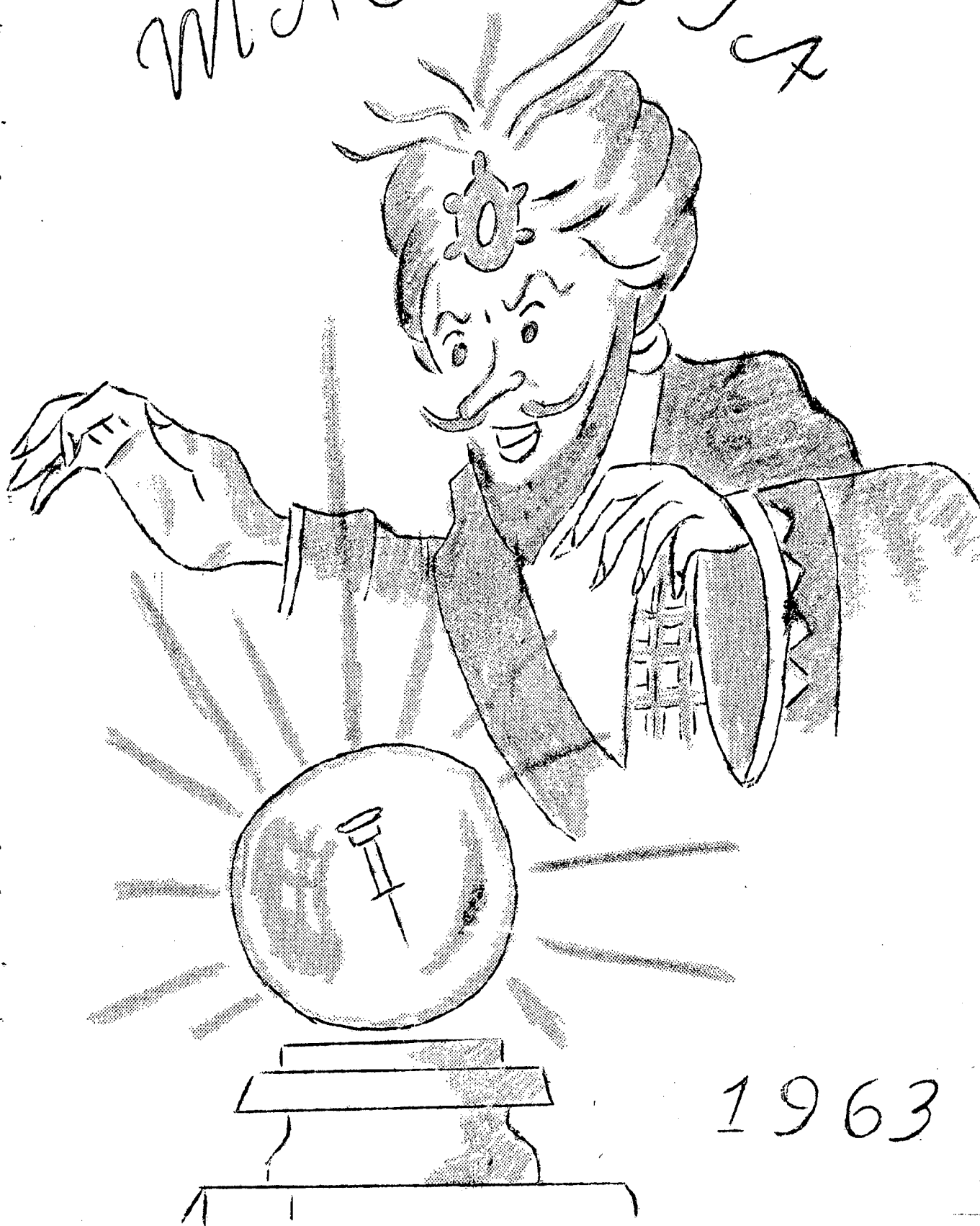
After a hot breakfast the next morning we walked a mile to the main highway (a dirt road) where we got a truck ride.

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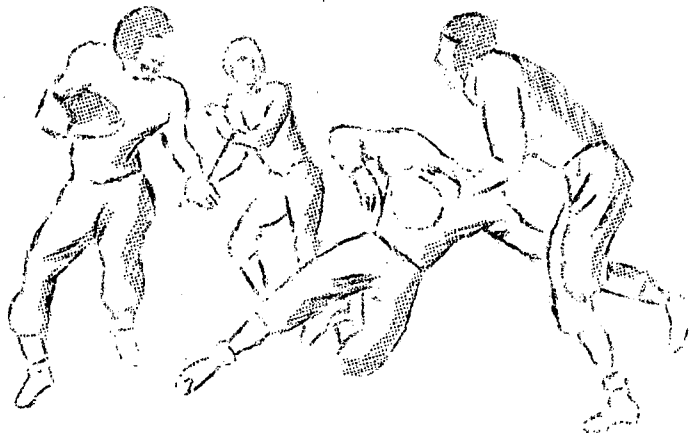
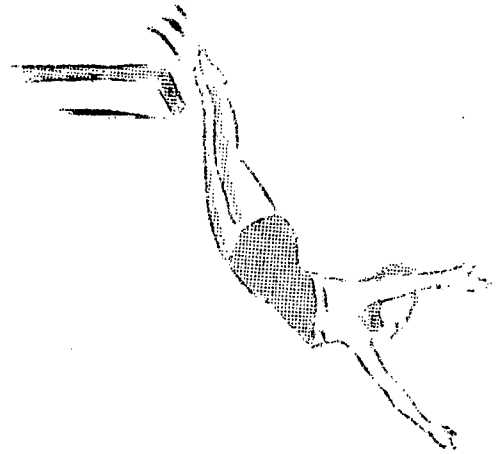
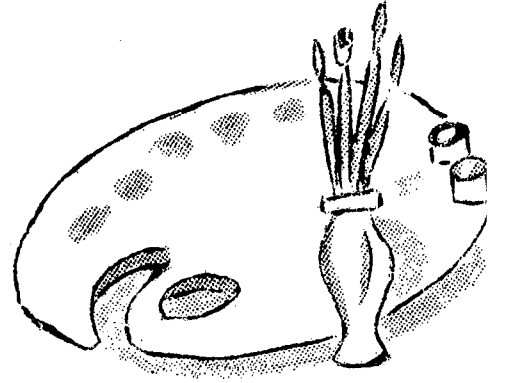
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P I N G P O N G
