truthfully say it has been very, and hope that it will continue to be as such.

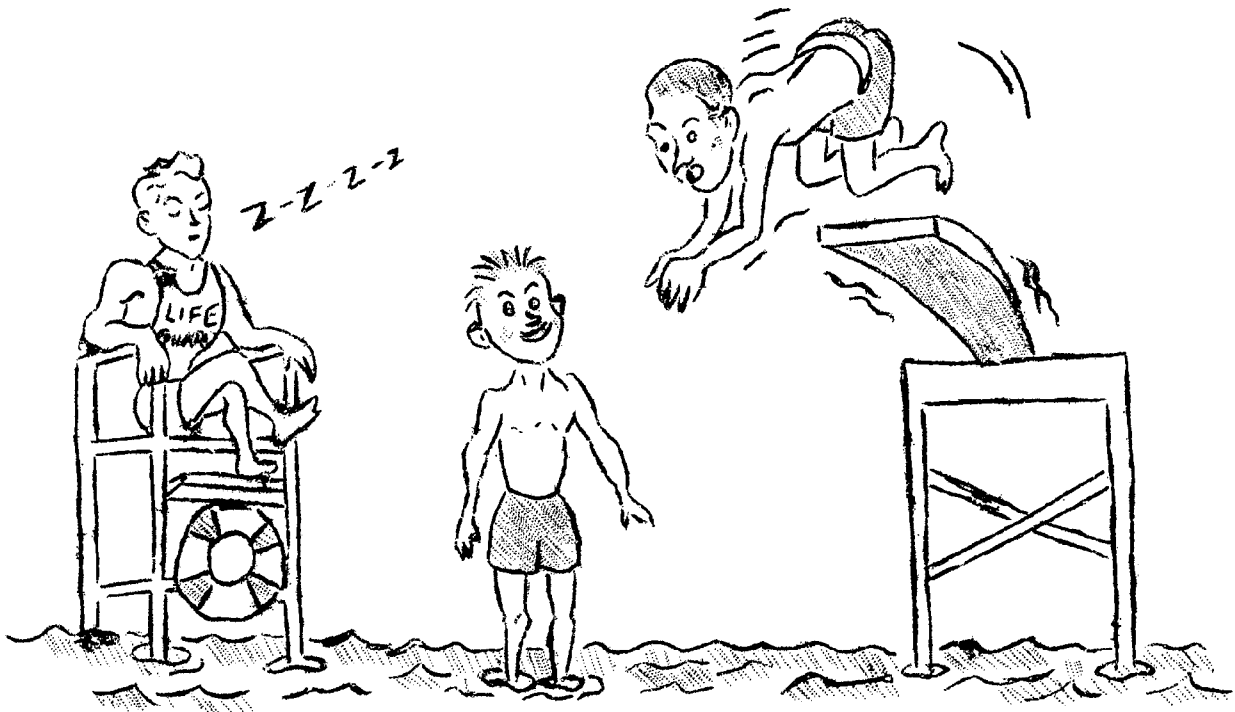
#### RECOMMENDATIONS

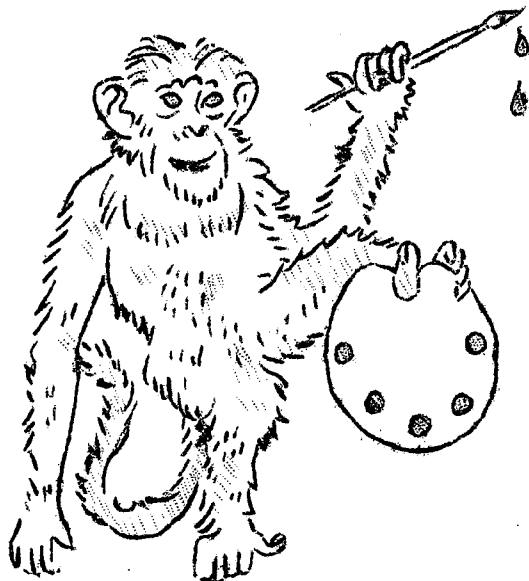
They say the road to success is paved with many stumbling blocks; our blocks go by another name - the Senior and L.I.T. boys.

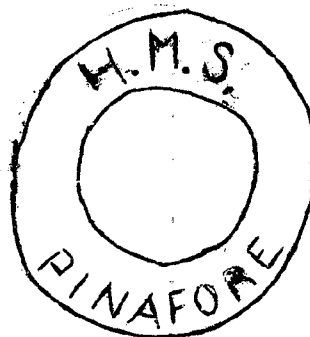
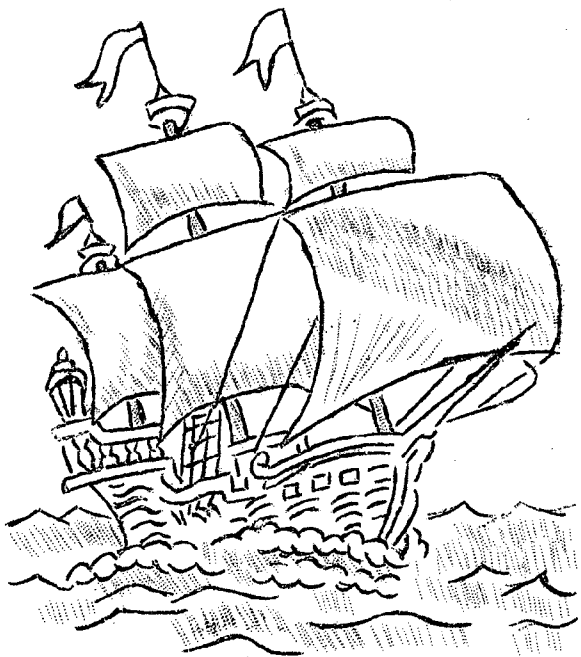

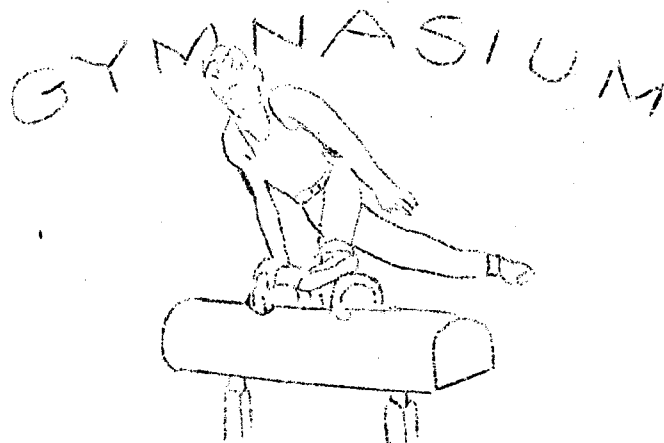

## CAPTAIN'S COMMENTS

I was just about to lie down after an exhausting Visitor's Day when an announcement called everyone to the dining hall for a small snack. Spirit was high, the kids singing one song after another at the top of their voices. Up stood Mr. Horwich to introduce our new assistant nurse. Myra Jacobson stood up on the head table, asked for quiet and started to sing those dramatic, memory-giving words, "L'shalom l'vracha!" Chaos began; members of the head staff jumped up, unrolling the colored banners' material. I ran up towards the front of the dining hall in order to hear Frank read out the team lists. Captains - Ivan and Toby (yellow), Irwin and Judy (blue), Dave and Marlene (white), and .... Everyone said I was the only possible choice left and I was getting nervous. All my eight years as a camper and two years as a counsellor I had wanted to be a captain, but at this moment I wasn't so sure. And then Frankie announced, "Captain of the Red Team, (pause) Keith Ross and Elaine Pearlman". I almost fainted.

Two days of hard preparation began. The team was given a pep talk on spirit and informed of the fact that the red team had won more Maccabiot than any other team. This year we would do it again. The various responsibilities (drama, song and dance, marching, etc) were assigned and although I kept thinking I wouldn't have enough to do, throughout the week I managed to rest only during rest periods.

Opening night soon came upon us. The first march-past and mifkad was not all peaches and cream for us, but we survived and did well. The program for the first day of Maccabia consisted of Regatta in the morning, Track and Field in the afternoon and team games after supper. Track was very kind to the Red Team; our runners piling up enough points to give us a comfortable lead. A great swim meet was held on Thursday morning when only 30 points separated Red Blue and Yellow teams. At this point in Maccabia the standings couldn't have been closer, for Blue and Yellow had tied for first in the swim meet. We had only to follow it to the end.

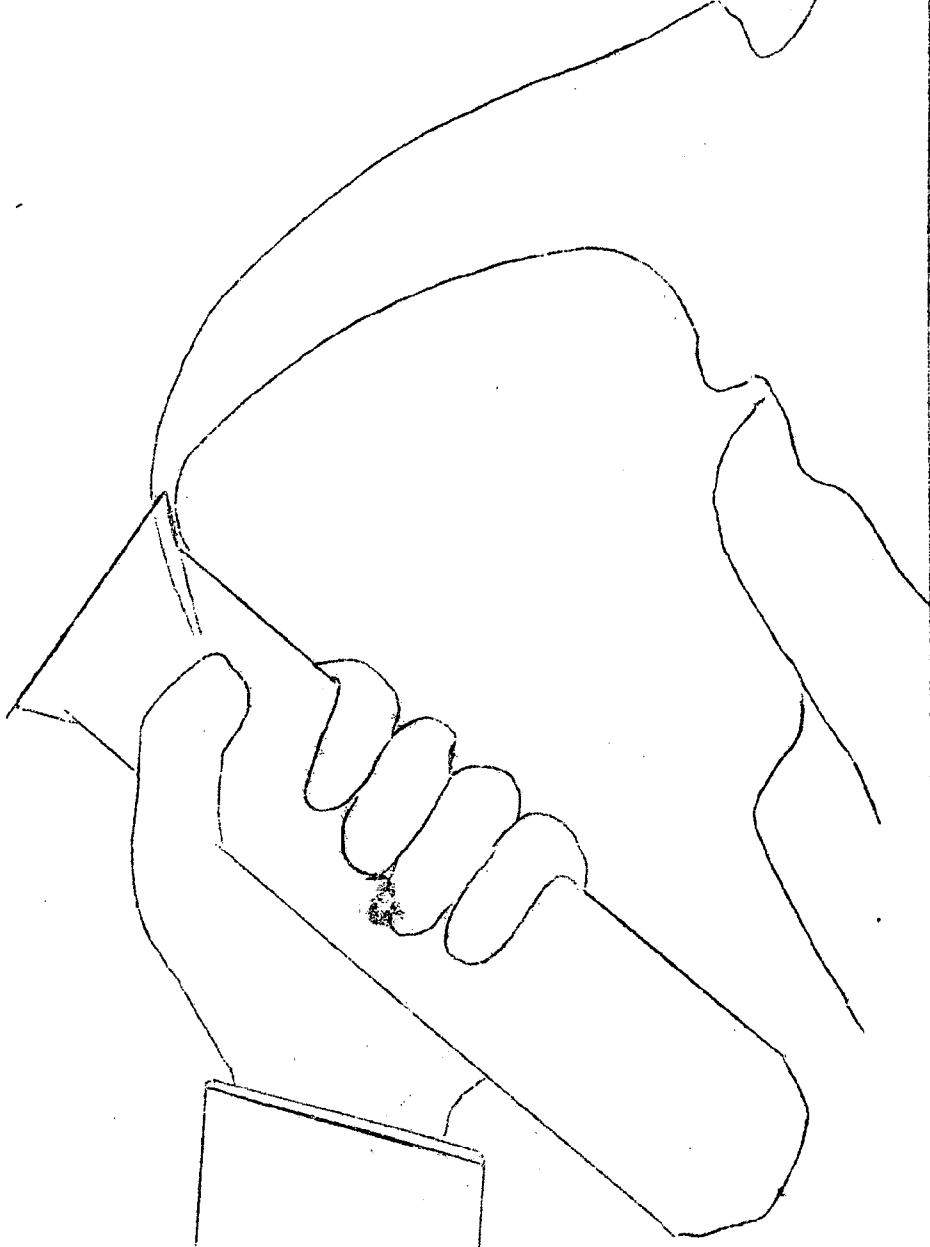
