Six weeks is but a small arc on the circumference of the yearly revolution we all make in the circle game of life. Each year's cycle is a bit different from the one before. It is only when we have a limited opportunity to observe one another that we are made most aware of these changes. Continuous exposure in contrast dulls our appreciation of the alterations because of the gradual and subtle nature of change. For this reason the month and a half spent at Kadimah each year is significant in enabling us to recognise the changes in others which reciprocally allows us to detect those changes within ourselves. Each of us brings a unique extension of ourself to camp each summer that wasn't there before. The transitions are so sharply perceptible at camp because we haven't seen one another for some forty-six weeks between seasons. This mutual acknowledgement of change gives rise to increased understanding of one another which is in turn of great relevance in understanding ourselves. The understanding comes because man is in large part a manifestation of his relation to those around him.

This fundamental education in human understanding provided by our summers at camp is one of the most important functions the camp could hope to serve. But it is also the least celebrated. Maybe it is something we should all think about. For my own small share in this education, I'd like to say thank you, everyone.


To the campers, I can only say that you've been a great group and I sure do hope that you all had an enjoyable summer. To the counsellors, thanks for a job well done.

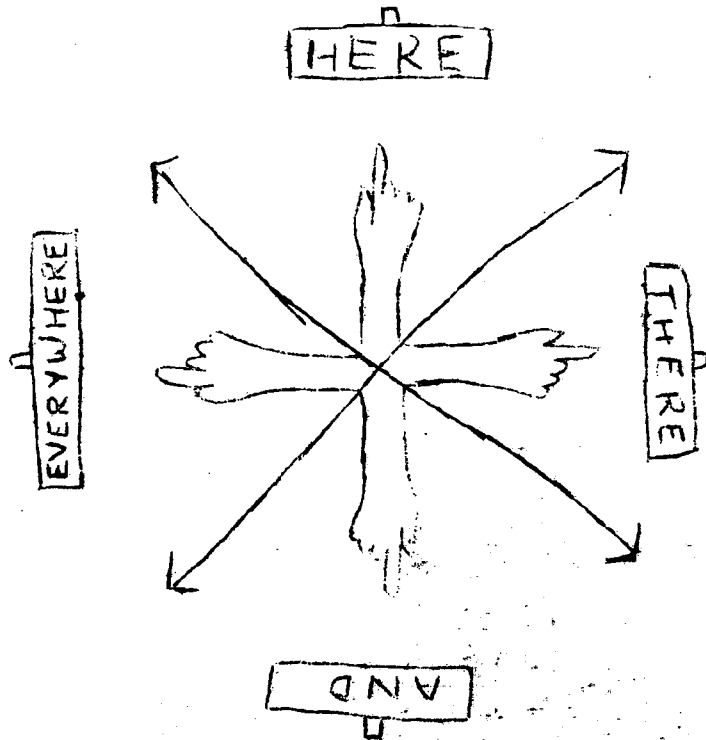
CAMPER'S COUNCIL REPORT

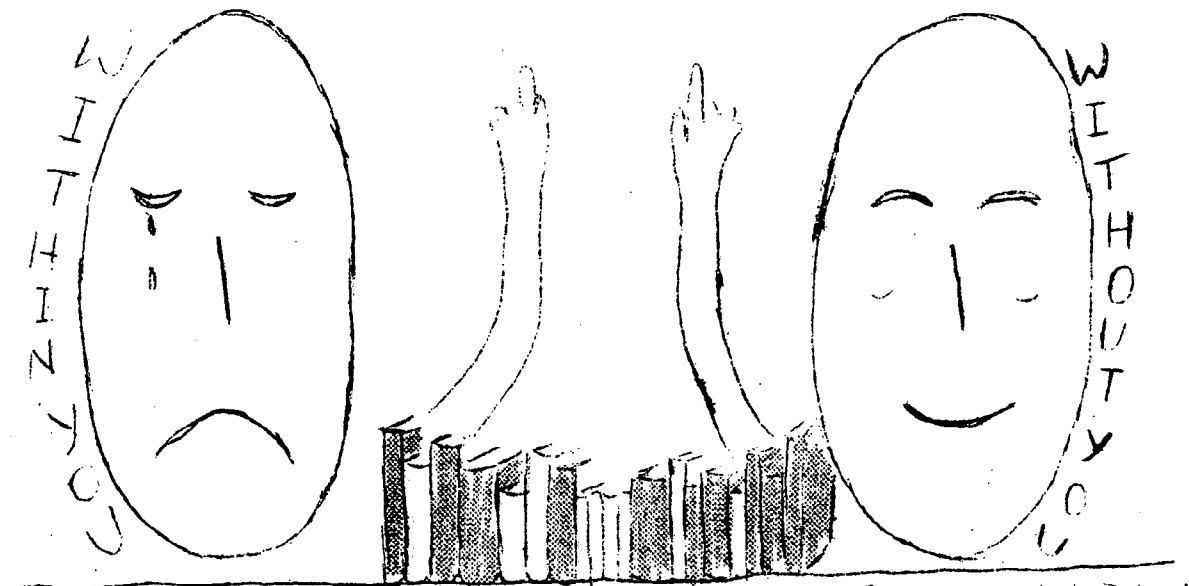

I remember A.&C. Our banner looks much smaller now. Those girls did a really good job. We won A.&C.

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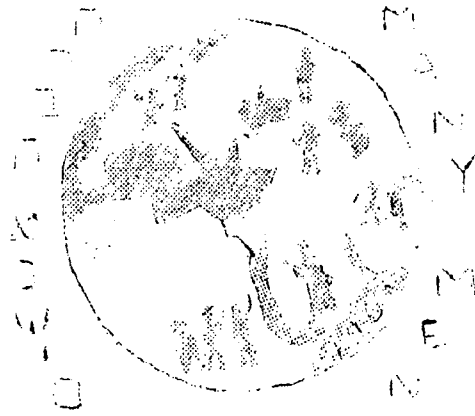
