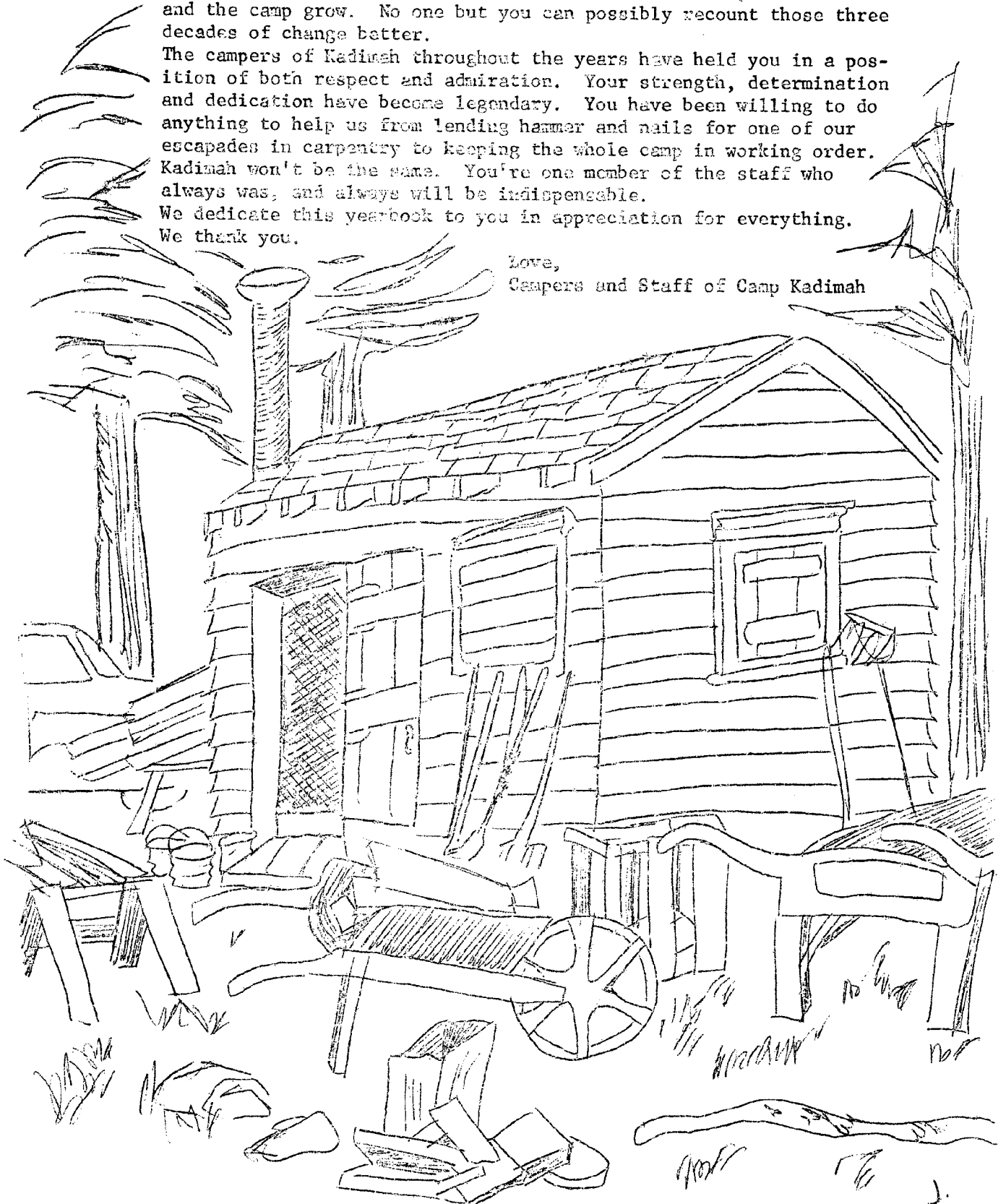
Dedication...

To all the counselling staff-who were always willing to sacrifice their experience in hiking to help weak old Gary carry the supplies.....on the truck.

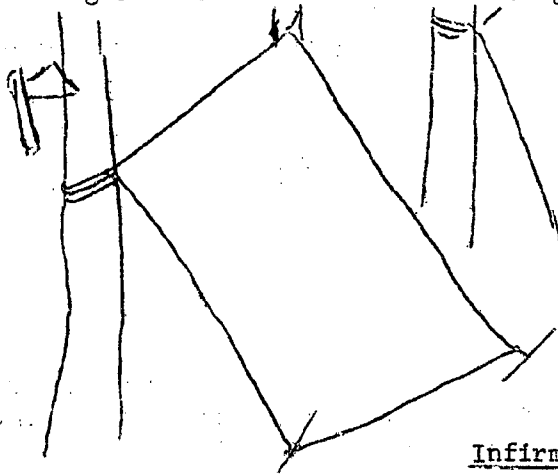
Most of all to Gary and his weak universal joint- without whose help&fortitude our hikes would have starved.

To translate the previous sentences we simply want to say that without exception you were all great and this made our summer great.

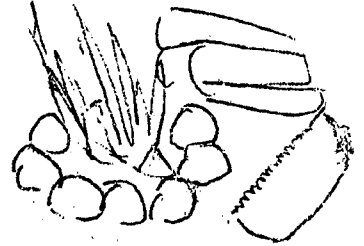

As the tents rose and the clothes rotted on the clotheslines, everybody grouched and coughed and scratched, the infirmiry bulged with patients.

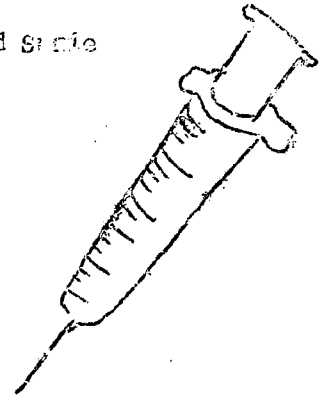

"Anyone who can walk, can dance"

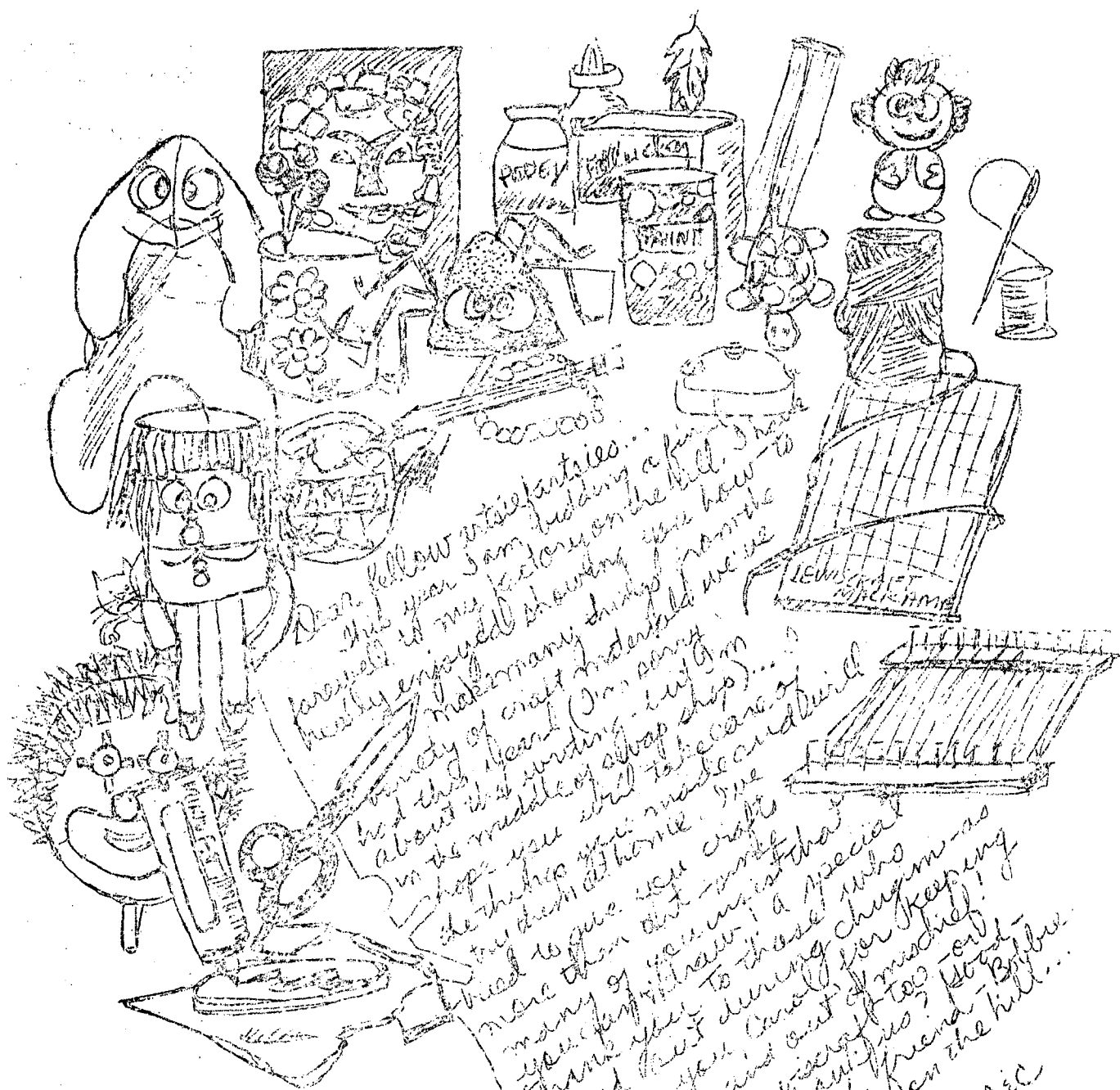

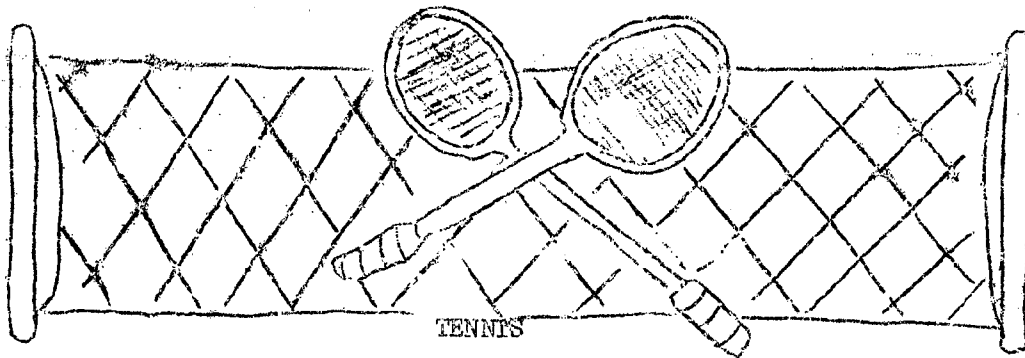
A MESSAGE FROM THE KITCHEN STAFF

All in all, I believe we've had a very successful summer. I hope those who participated enjoyed themselves as much as I did teaching the chug.

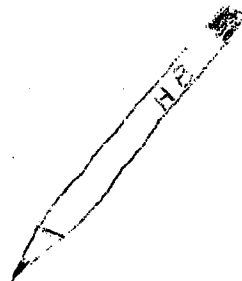
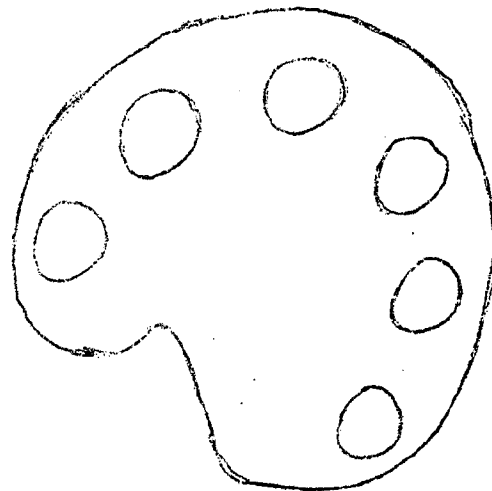
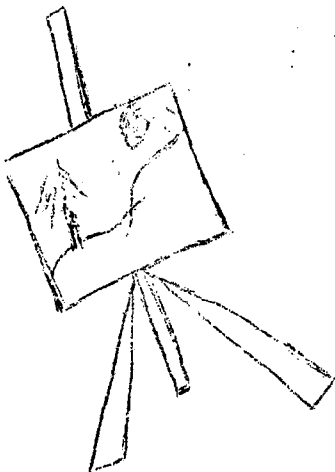
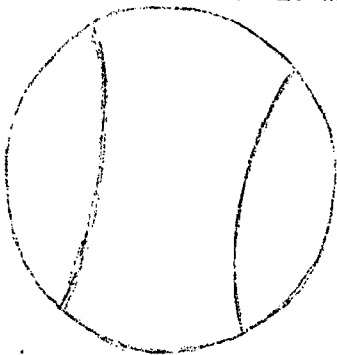

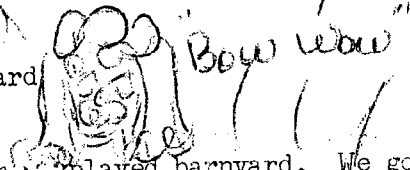


Camp Kadimah

Late in the summer, the number of occupants in our cabin was reduced by one when Norm Stein left for Europe. (We all hope he had a good time.)

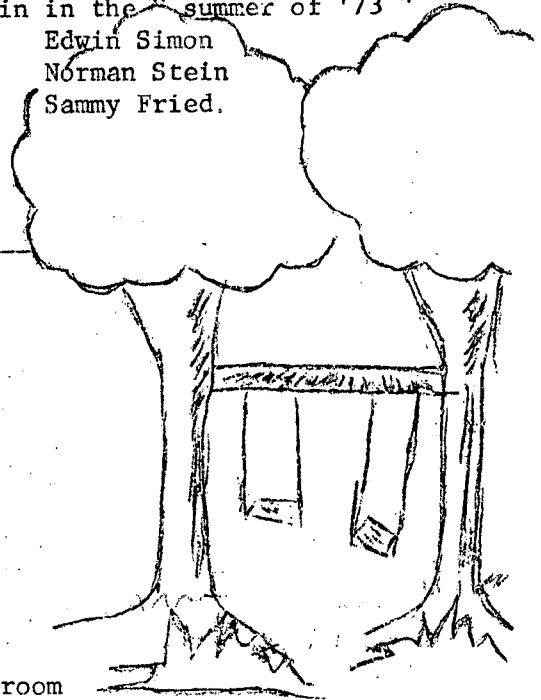

" I want rowing."

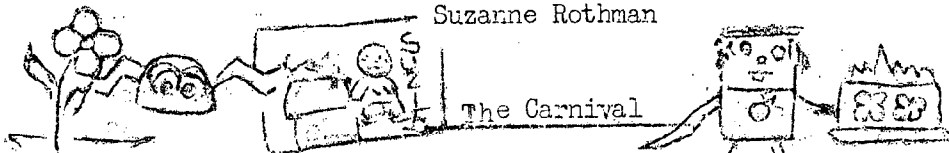

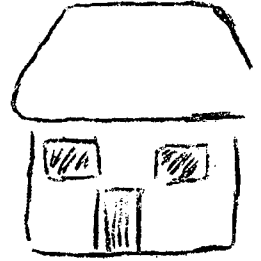


TISHA B'AV

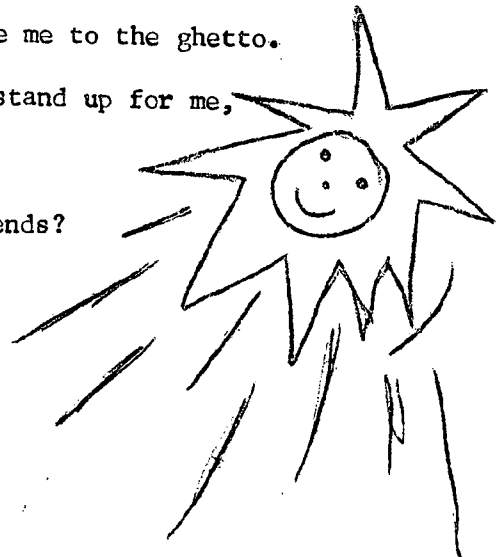
KOCHOT EXCURSION

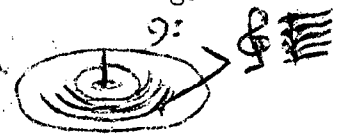
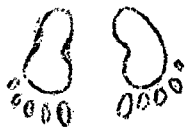


RIKUD

MEL YAD REPORT

A visual display would be a more appropriate means of summarizing this summer's machleket-yad program than this short article. But seeing as I'm confined to a small space in this yearbook, I'll try to put my feelings about the peula into words. Ideally, mel yad is a tool in an individual's creative development as well as a means of releasing the built-up pressures and conflicts stimulated by camp program and environment. Because of the concentrations and responsibility demanded of the chanichim (to various degrees) in the course of the daily program at Machar, mel yad is most instrumental in maintaining a balanced schedule of activities and a balanced state of mind for each individual. This summer I have attempted to liberate mel yad from the confines of a structural, instructional hour-long period. I offered a variety of projects which utilized both arts and crafts materials—from sketching and water color compositions to macrame and basketry. The opportunity to heighten artistic creativity as well as to actually develop certain more traditional crafts was there for anyone who was motivated positively toward participating regular programming days was smaller than would have been ideal for those who wanted to get more involved in mel yad projects. As a result, some people never got past their baskets----- while others whose machleket seemed to have mel yad 3 days out of every 5 moved from one project to the next fairly quickly. Despite limited time— I was fairly satisfied with the program as a whole. Not many chanichim have concrete results from the peula to take home with them----but all the same it was at least a tolerable activity for most and I infer it was really enjoyed by some.



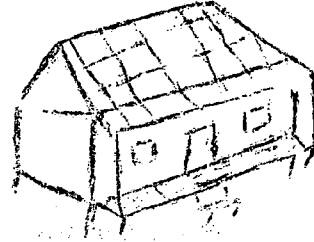
