

RACE RIOTS

The author feels, that non-violent ways of Dr. Martin Luther King would help the position of the Negro better in the "Great Society" than organizations such as R.A.M. (Revolutionary Action Movement).

SIX DAY WAR

In late May a shocking headline hit the newspapers of the world: "Nasser orders U.N. peace-keeping force out. Gulf of Aqaba closed." In a few days, Arab troops moved off Israel's border. What was Israel to do? They were surrounded on all sides. Levi Eshkol appointed Moshe Dayan as minister of defence. On June 5, Israel struck, winning battle after battle. The Jordanian side of Jerusalem was captured along with the Wailing Wall. Nasser claimed that the United States and England helped Israel. He ordered all Americans out of Egypt. To do the state sent the ship Liberty to pick them up. An Israeli patrol boat accidently fired on it and killed some men. The Israeli government apologized for this. On June 9, a cease fire was agreed to. However a day later in retaliation to bombardment the Israelis invaded Syria, and were within the gates of the capital. The war was over on June 11. Nasser was about to resign. In six days Israel won the war.

DE GAULLE AWAKENS CANADA

One of the most stirring news events that went on in the world during this summer at Camp Kadimah was President Charles De Gaulle's visit to Canada.

Le grand Charles arrived at Wolfe's Cove in Quebec on Monday, July 24, and for three days expounded the line of the French Canadian Separatists, "Vive le Quebec Libre- Long Live Free Quebec!

He aroused such a stir in both English and French Canada that one would have to say that his visit was the most controversial of any State Visitor in the history of Canada. How appropriate this international story should occur in Centennial year!

To English Canada here was a man probably senile, meddling in the internal affairs of a country to an extent which could only be interpreted as an attempt to incite rebellion or at the very least, around French Canada to a fever pitch in support of Separatism.

To French Canada, here is a man from the Motherland, stirring the imagination and idealism of every Frenchman; calling on the people to arise and once again build up the French speaking world to its eighteenth and mineteenth century colonial greatness.

His French words were moving and charged with emotion. Noone could expect French Canadians not to be filled with joy and lost in nostalgia of the French Dream.

In any case, Canada was in an uproar and after Prime Minister Pearson made it plain to him and the Quebec government that his visit was not appreciated nor "acceptable", Le President cut it short and went home to France.

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Three days later in Paris he issued a statement with full Cabinet backing that France would be delighted to help in any way possible, any independent aims of French Canada.

Prime Minister Pearson, being the diplomat he is, ducked the issue and said only that he hoped France and Canada could work out their problems in the usual good friendship that the two countries have exhibited towards one another in the past.

At presstime, that's where the story stands. Whatever its final consequences, it was a powerhouse of a story and will not be soon forgotten.



Yearbook Report

As I find myself about to embark upon five years of study at Medical School beginning this fall, I have chosen to view the operation of my section this past summer as being analgous to the workings of the human body. 



OPENING.
