General Zionists, led by Iris Cappell of Chana Senesh achieved a close victory at the polls on Zionist Election Day Sunday, June 20. Ruth Newman's Labour Zionist upset pre-election predictions by trailing behind in second place in the final count. Eddie Cohen and his Mizrachi party were close behind, but Camp Kadimah decisively rejected the principles of force and violence as represented by Louis Greenspan of the Revisionist party.

The party standings according to the information supplied by the Axler News Service were as follows:

General Zionists	31
Labour Zionists	29
Mizrachi Zionists	13
Revisionists	12

The campaign went off to an early start Wednesday when chalked up General Zionist slogans appeared at strategic spots on the campus. However, Labour early demonstrated the energy they were to display throughout the campaign by an attractive sign on the teapot which answered the question "Who Built Up The Homeland?" by the simple word "Labour!". The Mizrachi also indulged in a burst of activity that day by hanging up slogans on the teapot, cabins, and --stealing a march on the other parties--in the dining hall, which was subsequently declared out of bounds. The Revisionists made up for a comparative scarcity of signs the first few days by the ferocity of their convictions and their persuasions.

On Sunday the staffs and supporters of all four parties participated in a feverish morning of painting and tacking up posters. Here again the skill of the Labourites was demonstrated by a beautiful sign painted by Sally Newman which hung high over the platform of the grandstand.

The afternoon of election day began with a grand parade in which the General Zionists distinguished themselves with a large number of attractive and forceful placards.

Before a large audience of visitors and voters, the candidates introduced by their campaign managers, Sid Tobin of the Generals, Don Harris of Labour, Joe Levison of the Revisionists and Myer Mendelson of Mizrachi, eloquently presented the platform and principles of their parties for the approval of the electorate. This part of the campaign was marked by Iris Cappell's sincerity, Ruth Newman's very fine platform style, the fire of Louis Greenspan's oratory and Eddie Cohen's reasoned and high-spirited arguments. The election speeches were interspersed with enthusiastic party cries and songs.

Visitors to the camp were invited to join campers, counsellors and staff in casting ballots at one of the three polls for the party of their choice.

The returning officers was Sheba Miller and periodically throughout the afternoon partial returns were announced by Max Axler. The first returns seemed to favour the Labour party, but the final results announced at degel (flag raising and lowering) on Sunday revealed that the able leadership of Iris Cappell under the brilliant direction of her exceptionally efficient campaign manager, Sid (spelled with an 'i') Tobin piloted the General Zionists to victory.

Tsrif Laganya supplied a most entertaining bit of dramatics composed by Louis Greenspan in the form of "Duffy's Tavern." Composer Greenspan also entertained the audience with an excellent impersonation of Al Jolson.

Putting a grand finale to an exceptionally good program were the numbers presented by staff members.

PALESTINIAN SONGS AND DANCES

The song and dance period this season has been very successful and have given a great deal of enjoyment to all who participated.

After most of the dinner and supper meals, Palestinian songs under the supervision of Miriam Figler, Julia Kaplan and Jack Rafuse were sung. This was something which the campers (all but the Mitbach Crew) looked forward to. On Friday evenings, after the Sabbath services, a special song and dance period is started in which all the campers join.

The older campers that know the songs and dances try to teach the younger children such dances as the Hora with considerable ease and success. Altogether the songs and dances have been highly successful and satisfactory. Under the supervision of the song and dance leaders, assisted at times by Chaver Shuster, Chaver Axler and Chavera Miller, this season's songs and dances have proved to be the most successful since camp began.

MOVIES AT CAMP KADIMAH

As every Monday and Thursday evenings roll around, all campers, particularly the juniors, eagerly look forward to the movies which are going to be shown.

This summer, the movies, as well as being entertaining, have been educational. For our juniors, Donald Duck and The Three Bears have played an important role and the staff and counsellors have enjoyed these as much as the campers.

On July 21, a March of Time, entitled, Music For Americans, was shown and delighted the music lovers of Camp Kadimah. Several Zionist films, including a "Day in Daganiah" and "Land of Promise" were also shown.

IN THE KADIMAH
SPORTS ARENA

Nineteen forty-seven at Kadimah saw one of the best and most varied sports programs in the short but satisfying history of the camp. Under the direction of Hans Hoffman of Montreal, coach of the 1945 Juvenile swim champs of Canada, the set up of athletics was ably administered and carried out.

He was fortunate in having an able sports staff with specialists Gitta Arron, Gordon Simon, Joe Levison, and Ellie Marshall, a late but nevertheless popular arrival.

Bolstered by a new and well staffed waterfront this was one of the banner years in Kadimah aquatics. As usual Mr. Hoffman met his quota of swim tests and will carry on the the high reputation of the camp which last year had one of the highest swimming standards in the dominion according to Red Cross reports.

Daily instruction classes were again presented to the campers, along with other classes such as diving, fancy swimming, canoeing, lifesaving. The instruction, given this year by a staff which has had a year more training is efficient and marked progress is being made by pupils.

In contrast to last year diving classes this year have the second heaviest enrollment in waterfront activities. Advanced classes are now using both high and low boards while intermediate classes are using corner towers.

Life saving classes this year are seeing a bevy of new faces as the older and more powerful swimmers are resting on their laurels and letting the rising stars take over. Bronze, intermediate, elementary and Unigrip courses were given this year and a number of silver awards are expected to be earned by the end of the camp.

Also much improved this year is the system of sports periods in both afternoon and morning free periods. Through the kindness of Murray Corbett, physical director of the Halifax Y.M.C.A. the camp was able to obtain a high bar, and this combined with the efforts of Mr. Isnor, camp caretaker who rigged the rings and climb ropes add for some well attended and much enjoyed classes in app artus. Hans Hoffman ably assisted by Ellie Marshall took the classes.

Sports periods for the juniors and inters were supervised by members of the sport staff and were looked forward to by the campers. Two well organized leagues functioned throughout the season in basketball and softball. Coached by Ethel Smofsky, the Kadimites at time of writing look like a sure bet to cinch the camp title. In softball teams captained by Louie Greenspan Phyllis Goldfarb, Ellis Ross and Eddie Cohen are having a close race for the pennant and results are still unknown.

Two Maccabia days were held, the first on Sunday, July 13 being a great success and the other, not completed at time of writing having a great program arranged. Competition for the trophies which are being donated by the Halifax YMHA is keen and in the lead for some of the coveted silverware is Harvey Arron of Halifax. Runners up are "clores Simon, Ellis Ross, Naomi Sharp, Mina Hoffman, Morton Brown, Ed Cohen, Howard Tannebaum, Weldon Levine, Morris Cohen, Helen Goldfarb and Iris Cappell.

The main part of the first field day program was land sport mixed in with water activities. However this next program will have greater emphasis on water activities and the long awaited canoe events will be one of the foremost of these.

On the whole regulations this year are not as stringent as those of last season. Junior swimmers are allowed rowboats and intermediates canoe according to the new plan.

Another of the activities that is a new arrival in the current sport program is the boxing class, held four times weekly and well attended by the upper and lower inters. The twenty seventh of July Maccabia saw two snappy bouts involving four of the boxers of the class, Mo Cohen, Mort Brown, Paul Goldman and Frank Elman. With new apparatus this year speed bags, sand bags, skip ropes etc., the boxers had a good opportunity to pick up the fundamentals of the sport.

Counsellor sport is also at a high peak. To date the camp softball club has played two games, defeating Barss Corner 14-7 and taking a 6-3 trimming from New Germany on our home diamond. Two more games are in prospect during the Judean convention.

High interest was taken in the various camping-pong tournaments with both boy and girls campers tournaments being operated and a counsellors round also arranged. Ellie Marshall won the staff title and is acknowledged camp champ to date.

In closing the sport section the athletic staff wants to say that in our expectations for the campers improvement in the different branches of athletics we were not disappointed. The campers, boys and girls have all lived up to expectation and even better things may be expected from them next year.

Here's hoping to see all of you on the waterfront, the basketball court or the softball diamond next season for another summer of clean sport.

There is a little ball of bitter herbs, the parsely, and the bone of roast meat. Of course, there is the afikoman which is placed in a beautiful embroidered bag. In the middle of the table stands a decanter of clear wine surrounded by Mother's best silver goblets.

Also set is a tall glass for Elijah. The cup of Elijah is to hope that the Jewish people will be in peace and that they will have homeland in Eretz Yisreal.

In all Jewish homes the youngest child asks the Four Questions and the father reads the Haggada. The Haggada tells the story of the deliverance of the Jews from Egypt.

After a delicious meal, we generally sing some Passover songs. By then everyone is quite tired and ready to go to bed.

The novelty of eating delicacies, different from every day, using new dishes and the story it stands for makes Passover one of my favourite holidays.

ARTS AND CRAFTS

The Arts and Crafts Department was under the leadership of Miss Rebecca Markow. She was assisted by Misses Bernice Hoffman, Miriam Figler and Mr. Mitchell Glube.

At the beginning of the season, the Juniors colored pictures of all the Jewish Holidays. These colored pictures were then compiled into booklets of which the covers were shellaced and then finished off with gold and silver as well as scarlet cordas. After finishing these booklets, the Juniors made clay candle holders which they painted with bright colors and then shellaced. Some very pretty Rosh Hashonah cards were turned out by the youngsters and are going to be mailed to their parents. As a final project, the Juniors created a desert. Camels, palm trees and clay figures helped to finish off the desert effect.

During this time the Lower Intermediates, boys and girls, made some different things. First of all they illustrated creative drawings of the life and industries carried out in Palestine. After turning in such nice drawings they drew Jewish symbols on pie-plates. These were painted and then finished with a coat of shellac.

The Upper Intermediate and Senior Boys worked with linocuts, making designs suitable for Rosh Hashonah. The boys then worked with clay making clay menorahs and then painting them gold or silver. As the concluding item for the season, they constructed a model Moshav out of cardboards.

Senior and Upper Intermediate Girls created their own designs for Rosh Hashonah cards and painted them with water colours. The girls also embroidered Shabbos challah covers and matzoh covers for Pesach.

During these periods the campers showed a great deal of interest in the work and as a result turned in some very lovely pieces of work. The Arts and Crafts Department has always been a success, but, many think, this year has topped them all.
