The key? - Powerful organization. Somehow he gave us what we want degree him. Maybe the program really was good despite what some people said.






SHALIACH'S MESSAGE


The first programme sponsored by the council was a hayride, which took place during the preparatory days of Maccabia and offered the relaxation which we

The buggies roll on, driving's still more reckless.


Evening program begins for the day is done,



Medical and scientific research has recently completed a series of studies on a disease commonly known as "Camperitis." We are fortunate to be able to publish in the 1964 issue of Camp Kadimah yearbook by the kind permission of the camp nurse, the results of these exhaustive studies.

Camparitis is prevalent in many areas of H.A. during the months of July and August. It a pears to be intensified by environmental conditions. Recent studies at a prominent camp in H.S. have successfully proven that there is a demonstrable increase in this distance when persons are exposed to environmental changes such as work, good food, dating problems, close living quarters, etc.

Although this disease is seldon fatal and the recovery prognosis of those affected is generally fevorable (as soon as the warm weather arrives

for swimming) the following treatment has been advised:

1) see the camp nurse.

2) exaggerate the symptoms out of all proportions (this is particularly effective when you are carried to the infirmary by your friends, accompanied by grounings and tests. Remember, "practice makes perfect").

3) advise the nurse that you recovered best last year when kept out of swinming, permitted to rest all day until evening activity, eating ice-cream and frequent visits from your bygfriend or girlfriend.

4) refuse to accept her advice that diversional activities (such as swimming and exercise) are the only effective therapeutic measures necessary.

5) as one noble last effort persuade her tat at least an aspirin will help.

If this treatment is not successful at the end of 6 weeks the recommended and final resort is a holiday cruise----home!

As camp nurse for 1964, Itd like to thank each one of you for your co-operation and friendship throughout the season. I've enjoyed knowing you and nursing you. Heny fond memories of camp will linger on long after "Kadimah" is prepared for its winter attire.



Scouting Report 1964



On behalf of Norman Rose and myself, I would like to wish you all a Good Scouting Year and the hope that we'll see each other around the campfire once again at Camp Radima,



"DO I :", HE SAID WITH A SLY GRIN ON HIS FACE, "HOW ABOUT HAVING EVERYONE PACK THEIR TRUNKS, MAKING THEM THINK THAT WE HAVE TO LEAVE CAMP EARLY DUE TO WATER CONTAMINATION IN THE SWIMMING AREA?"
"SOUNDS PRETTY GOOD"

FOR THE NEXT FEW WEEKS WHEN ANYBODY ASKED IF THERE IS GOING TO BE A MACCABIA, THE ANSWER THEY RECIEVED WAS THAT IERACH WAS AGAINST IT FOR SEVERAL REASONS AND THAT WE MAY HAVE IT FOR ONE DAY.

COMMENTS ABOUT THE SITUATION CIRCULATED THE CAMP AND BANNERS WERE MADE TO IMPRESS HEAD STAFF WITH THE FEELING THAT KADIMAH WANTED MACCABIA FOR 1964.

THE DAY BEFORE VISITING DAY WAS WHEN IT ALL STARTED. IERACH AND MYSELF BEGAN TO WORK OUT THE DETAILS IN ORDER THAT THE ANNOUNCE-MENT MAY BE WEDNESDAY EVENING. THEN TO VERIFY ALL PLAND MR. HORWICH WAS CALLED IN NOTHING WAS REVEALED TO ANY OTHER MEMBER OF THE HEAD STAFF EXCEPT THE FACT THAT THERE WOULD BE A MACCABIA THIS YEAR, IN ORDER TO OBTAIN THEIR AID IN PLANNING THE PROGRAM. WHEN AND HOW IT WAS TO BE ANNOUNCED WAS KEPT BETWEEN THE THREE OF US.

OUR MAIN PROBLEM WAS TO MAKE IT AUTHENTIC ENOUGH FOR PEOPLE TO BELIEVE ----AS THIS WAS A PROBLEM AS ANYTHING OUT OF THE USUAL ROUTINE AT THIS TIME OF CAMP SEASON IS IMMEDIATELY SUSPECTED AS MACCABIA----AND THIS WAS TO BE NO EXCEPTION.

TO BOLIDIFY EVERYTHING, A MEMBER OF THE CAMP COMMITTEE WOULD BE IN CAMP WEDNESDAY NOON TO ANNOUNCE THAT THE HEALTH DEPT. 



To Arnie I leave a head-staff proof hideway and his ring. (maybe he'll do something more worthwhile with it than give it to the likes of me.)


To Jon Goldberg and Tonny Webber I leave lots of food for them to eat five minutes before the camp eats because as the sign says "serve the Juniors First."




