The sun still shines as we end this rhyme.







CABIN 13 AMNUAL REPORT by David Newman and J. Lark David age 12


This year was different then any other we worked as a whole and not one for himself. This year we have Cabin 13 and for those that don't know they way it is next to the famous landmark known as the old barn(


