

Once, in a great synagogue, on Erev Yom Kippur, the Baal Shem Tov, may he rest in peace, was conducting the Kol Nidre service. The congregation was filled with all the learned and righteous men from the countryside around.

When the Baal Shem Tov rose to chant for Kol Nidre, a hush fell over the entire room. As he sang the Kol Nidre prayer, the Besht felt however that the prayer was not being heard by the Ribbonu Shel Olam.

And the Baal Shem Tov turned to the congregation and implored them to join him as he chanted it a second time. But still, the Baal Shem Tov knew that G-d was unaware of his prayers. So a third time they sang the Kol Nidre, and still the Besht was not satisfied. "How can this be? With all these great and learned scholars, how can our prayer go unheard?" So with tears in his eyes, he sang the nigun once again. At the conclusion, still unsatisfied, he turned toward the assembled multitude. Silence fell over them.

Then suddenly, from the back of the great synagogue, the silence was broken. It was a small boy, whistling the Kol Nidre. The Besht stood without saying a word.

The Tzaddikim were amazed. Why did the Baal Shem Tov allow this in his synagogue? But then they saw that the Baal Shem Tov was no longer crying; his eyes were dry. They saw satisfaction and tranquility in his face as the young boy continued to whistle Kol Nidre.

After the child had finished, the Besht explained the event to the learned and righteous men in his congregation, saying: "All the words of the greatest and wisest men cannot move the Lord as can the whistling of a young child."

And they continued the service.

I hope that Kadimah '72 has been like this. This year has been a new beginning. For years now we have been saying that this is a campers' camp. However, I am not sure that we have always followed this dictum.

Certainly we kept a constant supervision on our campers. They have been well fed, busy, and I hope, happy. But we failed to talk to them. And even more important, we did not listen to the whistling of every small child.


Now, I hope that things have begun to change. We have developed a program that is designed to meet the individual needs of everyone from the oldest staff member to the youngest gibbonim. 
To the staff and campers in Kadimah-Machar '72 who worked with me for a new beginning, thanks.

ting it to the various age levels.


Hopefully, through the follow-

new system may become apparent.



In the morning we have Peulot or activities in which all cabins have a cabin concensus to decide what Peulot they would like to take. You have a choice but, even instructions is compulsory.


In the afternoon there were chugim or hobbies that you were able to choose from. There were many good choices of which to pick two.


The most important accomplishment which we have achieved in camp is a strongly unified chevra, which has helped fulfill a great summer for all of us here.





Song and dance are two natural and beautiful means of expression. Generally (as in camp) one uses them as an expression of happiness. So please sing and dance, and don't forget to smile (always!)


CABIN C BUNK REPORT

PROBLEMS

- Bob Brym (Rosh Machar)

This article will not be a report of the camp season; I'm leaving the task of summarizing programming to the S'gan Rosh, Steve Biderman. Rather, I've decided to address myself to a specific problem which has been, is and will continue to be a problem for the matrichim and chanichim of Camp Machar. It's important to state at the beginning that problems can be of two types: (a) those that demand immediate solution, and (b) those that should remain as problems. The problem I'm writing about is of the second type; it is the problem of defining exactly what Camp Machar should be.

It is stated in the constitution of Atlantic Region Young Judaea that Camp Machar is a pre-Biluin camp - which means, I suppose, that it is the job of Machar to train a particular type of leader. And what is "particular" about the type of leader that Machar is supposed to train is this: he or she should be someone who is prepared to grapple with the problem of defining his position in the stream of Jewish history. But this is not only a personal problem, unique to every leader; it is also a problem of method within the senior camp. This should be pretty well obvious to everyone, for there are probably an infinite number of methods that may be employed in order to train the type of leaders we want to come out of Camp Machar.

Before Camp Machar existed - i.e., when Camp Kalimah only had a Senior Section, leaders of the type now desired were not trained. A system was used in which campers were simply 'loaned out' to other sections so that through some practical experience with a cabin, they would turn out to be reasonably proficient counsellors. But with the establishment of Camp Machar in 1969 this changed, for we were no longer interested in training counsellors, per se, but rather leaders of the type I described above. This meant an entirely different type of programming which, by 1971, included the preparation of model meetings and some evening programs, the institution of regularly scheduled sichot and ha'racha sessions, etc. And, just as importantly, it included a particular style of training which, under the leadership of Bruce Elman, developed from an unacceptable system in 1969 to an enjoyable, interesting, provocative and successful method in 1971.

This summer, the leadership of Camp Machar was handed over to myself and, simply on the basis of this 'handing over' a number of problems have arisen. In many ways (and, I think, in the most important ways) these problems have been problems of method, problems which were reminiscent of those we faced in 1969. It was (and, to a large extent, still is) my opinion that an important part of leadership training has to be the creation of a situation in which the chanichim learn to be self-reliant. In practical terms this means, for instance, that rules are not things which should be imposed on people but rather, norms which should develop out of the mutual respect that people have for one another. This one notion, which spread throughout the camp, created, more than any other single factor, the differences between this year and last year.

I believe that it would be naive to conclude that we have come full circle, that we are back where we started in 1969. Particularly in the last few days of camp I've made it a point to have some lengthy conversations with both the madrichim and the chanichim about the senior camp, and I think it is accurate to state that whereas 1/3 of the camp was basically dissatisfied with the summer, 2/3 of the camp felt that it was a valuable summer. And considering the fact of new leadership in Machar, that proportion is a good one: it is certainly much better than the comparable proportion in 1969.

So that's why I leave Camp Machar this summer dissatisfied in many ways, but basically pleased. And that's also why I like the title of this final yearbook. Because we have just experienced a "New Beginning". New Beginnings are sometimes hard, true. But they are usually valuable.


MACHAR VALEDICTORY





The Canoe Hike



Something Staff should always look forward to, is their own evening program. For this is the time to relax after a (so-called) hard days' work.



Maybe I have been a bit too nasty in my judgement of the situation. Perhaps over the next year I will acquire something new which I would gladly share with you for the next summer.



Water music was provided daily, in the key of C by all four occupants, and a pleasant array of "gauchis" was always found.


None of the girls in Cabin 25 will ever forget the Goshrim hike when it rained, and night we really poured!!
