SHIRA B'TZIBUR: NOT YOUR PARENTS SING ALONGI

On Sunday, July 14, Camp Kadimah was the first camp in North America to participate in an exciting new program called Shira b'tzibur. In partnership with the iCenter for Israel Education, the almost 500 Kadimah campers and staff built a community through song!

A tradition in Israel for decades, shira b'tzibur was generally considered as something for "older people". In recent years, this phenomenon has become very popular with younger audiences and these days, shirah b'tzibur is trendy, fun and even funky.

Each section learned their piece of the puzzle and in the

evening these pieces were woven together in a musical tapestry of community singing about love and peace. The "mash-up" featured Arik Einstein's timeless classic "Ani Ve'ata" (Me and You), which is a simple tune that talks about changing the world; "Salamm (Od Yavo Shalom Aleinu") as popular song sung in Arabic and Hebrew about peace; and "One Day" a song sung by reggae singer Matisyahu, expressing a hope for an end to violence and a prayer for a new era of peace and understanding.

The final result was inspiring. Watch out for the release of the video of this inaugural event to be posted on the CK website in the coming weeks.

B'YACHAD! THE CAMP KADIMAH

PARTNERSHIP CAMPAIGN

In honour of our 75th anniversary, we are embarking on B'Yachad! The Camp Kadimah Partnership Campaign where Kadimah's alumni and families living outside Atlantic Canada are being asked to step up in partnership with families from Atlantic Canada to ensure the continued strength of our precious camp. The B'Yachad Partnership Campaign will be a five-year plan to upgrade infrastructure and to create needed space for programming. Components will include a new septic system, cabin and program facility upgrades, an improved staff lounge, new tennis courts, and a refurbished Gibbieland playground.

Today's Camp Kadimah is vibrant and thriving and has a well-managed operating budget. Scholarships for Atlantic Canadian campers have been ensured thanks to the tremendous generosity of A.J Leventhal z"l and the fund he created for this purpose. The remaining piece to be addressed is the need to maintain and improve the physical infrastructure of the camp. The B'Yachad Partnership Campaign will provide the funds necessary to meet this need in a significant way and secure the future of Camp

Kadimah for our children and grandchildren.

Did any other family members attend camp?

(Eleanor attended camp Northland/ B'nai Brith in Ontario)Davids sisters Goldie, Brenda and Ellen all went to camp for varying lengths of time.

Why did you choose to come to Camp Kadimah?

David wished to meet wild Jewish

women which wasn't really an option growing up in Yarmouth as the only wild Jewish women in Yarmouth were his sisters. We send our kids to Kadimah because we believe in the importance of camp. We chose Kadimah because David grew up in Nova Scotia and knows how special Kadimah really is. Also two of our three children were born in Halifax so Kadimah gave our kids a chance to reconnect with their Halifax friends. As well, we think it is important to go to camp with a different group of friends than you spend the school year with.

What were your most memorable moments at camp?

Easy to answer: (1) A dart board was hanging on the side of our cabin. I missed the target by a long shot and landed a dart squarely in Victor Fineberg's arm as he was exiting the cabin. It changed our relationship. (2) Being bunked for a week. A week!! That was harsh. (3) Having a serious conversation about Judism with my counsellor at lunch while I was pouring ketchup on his feet underneath the table. For some reason he didn't find that too funny. I couldn't stop laughing. (4) Forming J.U.M. (Jewish Underground Mafia) with Brent Weiser and my cousin Phil and pulling anonymous and continuous raids on fellow campers. Causing general mayhem in the camp seemed to be a natural fit for us.(5) Winning back-to-back best camper awards. I now know the pressure Lebron must have felt going for the repeat in Cleveland.

Why have you chosen to donate to camp?

We chose to donate to camp because we know that kids have a lot of options for their free time in today's world. There are a lot of different activities as well as a lot of different camps out there. We want to see Camp Kadimah as a viable and competitive option for kids.

Why did you choose to donate in the way that you did?

We wanted to add something new and fun to the camp that could be enjoyed for years and generations to come.
